WALTER B. KLEEMAN TROPHY

In over 30 years experience with field trial people and their dogs, I have known many men . . . Walter Kleeman was a giant among these men.

After returning from the Pacific in the mid 40's I was introduced to the Brittany and attended my first field trial where I met Walter. By 1948 he and Alan Stuyvesant were grooming me for other duties far removed from simply hunting with the Brittany. In our frequent meetings and communications, Walter's devotion to the breed he admired and the organization he was so instrumental in founding became more and more apparent. His sense of fairness to all was sometimes obscured by his intense desire to formulate an organization to protect and preserve both breed and individual. Through many trying times he guided the destinies of the struggling American Brittany Club until he now leaves us with an organization of which we are all justly proud.

Walter's true sportsmanship was shown in regard to the National Champion Stake. Originally only lukewarm to the possibilities of such a program, he later worked untiringly to have it approved. The necessary journeys to New York and elsewhere were made at a great sacrifice of his time and efforts. It is only fitting that his name is attached to this stake, the greatest of all Brittany field trials, and is inscribed on the rotating trophy presented to the annual winner. The American Brittany Club is honored to have his authority and dignity perpetuated by this association. Some may give as freely and unselfishly of their time and energy, but it is doubtful if anyone will ever mean as much to the American Brittany Club as the late Walter B. Kleeman.

VERSATILITY-THE GREATEST VIRTUE

Hanging on the wall I face every day as I sit at my office desk is the picture that stimulated what I have to say. Naturally it depicts the Brittany Spaniel. I believe it significant that the lithograph was copyrighted in Paris in 1938, not long after the Brittany Spaniel was introduced into the United States. It was done by Leon Danchin, a well-known French artist noted for his graphic studies of wild life and sporting dogs.

This Brittany is no pretty-boy of the show ring, handsome as he is, nor is he performing in a style which would warm the heart of the Field Trial judge. This composite study shows him steady-to-flush to a covey of Hungarian Partridge, at ease beside a brace of recently retrieved ducks, carrying a shore bird, and making what looks like —praise be—a most solid point on a rabbit. One normally thinks of these acts in terms of several dogs such as the pointer, setter, hound or retriever and not in terms of one dog. But this IS one dog, a Brittany Spaniel, showing his versatility: the greatest virtue of the breed. It was this all-purpose aspect found only in the Brittany which led me to the purchase of my first in 1946. It has been my experience, hunting and working with Brittanies since that time, that has formulated my convictions. For the "one dog man" that all-purpose-Brittany is unexcelled.

A hunting dog has always been my favorite, and I am sure if my vocation had been one that established me in a fixed location, a Labrador or setter

would have been a charter member of the household. Stability of habitat has not been my destiny and frequent moves over the Continent have been routine. Not knowing where we would be living from year to year, not knowing what we would be hunting, just about ruled out the possibility of having a dog other than an all-purpose type. It was necessary that he be fairly small since shipping or traveling with any dog of size has obvious disadvantages. This situation in time led us to the Brittany Spaniel and we have indeed found him to be an admirable solution to all our problems. He has adjusted readily to new homes and environments and has been forever willing to hunt the game in evidence in the area.

How versatile can a dog be? Just how much can you teach him to do? Let me tell you about Britt. He was born in North Dakota and joined our family in Texas at the age of four months. He made his first point on quail shortly thereafter. His first retrieve was also quail, the age of six months, the result of an off-season lucky toss of a rock. As it worked out, to my knowledge, that was the last quail he had the privilege of picking up as we were transferred shortly thereafter, but not prior to the dove season. The pup was then about seven months old and he took to retrieving dove with some misgivings: the birds feathered out badly, a factor further complicated by very hot, dry weather. Nonetheless, he worked hard daily and in spite of heat. feathers and cactus was off to the start of a good life in the field.

His next outing was that same Fall in the State of Washington. At this time he and I had to part company for several months during which time I managed to prevail upon an old friend to take care of my bird dog. I am sure that he had some misgivings when he looked at that hard-worked pup, especially as he had been a setter man of long standing. Whatever doubt he felt at first was short-lived when the pheasant season opened shortly thereafter. In spite of the fact that the dog had never worked on pheasants, the opening day netted eleven cocks in an area noted for poor productivity. During the remainder of the season Britt worked and retrieved well.

For the next few years he was an Alaskan dog; if not the first Brittany, surely one of the first ever to be brought into the Territory. There he became acquainted with several new birds. He hunted pintail, Franklin, and ruffed grouse along with ptarmigan. Upland birds were but a minor part of the work, the heavy going came with ducks and geese. Over the years he worked in all kinds of weather and in water that varied from salt to murky glacial streams. Cold weather did not seem to bother him greatly and on more than one occasion he broke ice while making a long retrieve. Much of his waterfowl work was in the company of a Labrador. He was no match for this rugged dog's strength, But he always managed to retrieve his share of the birds, making up for what he lacked in size by employing keen nose and inherent bird-sense. Alaska was followed by Canada, with one fall on the Alberta prairies and two shooting seasons divided between ducks on the Ottawa River and ruffed grouse in the Gatineau Hills.

I suppose all animals have likes and dislikes. Britt's passion developed for frogs. He would spend untold summer hours entertaining himself, belly deep in water, trying to put a foot on a wiley amphibian. When he succeeded in pin-

ning one down, he would submerge his entire head so as to pick it off the bottom. If he had a pet hate I suppose it was flies; he would snap at any that came within range. Frustration was evoked by squirrels which he found exceedingly sassy and impertinent. To him, anything that moved was fair game. In some Happy Hunting Ground he still retains his intense desire to hunt, not caring much what, when or where it might be, for Britt was a true all-purpose dog.

The situation within the American Brittany Club might warrant some consideration. Obviously, the mission of any such organization is the ultimate improvement of the breed, an objective which precipitates no quarrel here. But is this being accomplished? The Brittany originally made his reputation as an all-purpose hunting dog, but we are not exploiting him as such in our club. He is relegated to the pointing-dog class in the field and as just another

dog in the ring. Disregarded is the Brittany's inherent desire to retrieve. Forgotten entirely is his ability to work water. Even his interest in fur is to be condoned if he is to be accepted as the true all-purpose dog.

The Brittany Club is young in years as clubs go, and if it were not for a few true lovers of the breed we would have no organization or club at all. A start had to be made and in order to be recognized, it had to be patterned after the structure of other previously organized clubs. The dog's pointing instinct was well-known, so it was natural to see the Brittany relegated to the pointing-dog class. So far, so good, but herein lies the danger. As the number of Brittanies increases and more clubs are organized, more and more attention will be paid to Field Trials. In that the dog is now competed in only pointing dog class, breeders will naturally develop strains that are long on range only and forget the traits that make the Brittany what he truly is. The show ring has its place only if it adheres to conformation, the conformation of the all-purpose hunting dog, and effectively discourages the development of a long-legged ranger of setter proportions. It would appear that a very critical period in the development of the Brittany as a breed is approaching. The decisions of the next few years may decide his ultimate fate.

There are a number of ways the prime characteristics of the Brittany Spaniel can be maintained, but probably the best method would be through the continued use of trials. Would it not be possible to run dogs in all-purpose trials wherein they would be required to retrieve both from land and water, point game and be steady to wing and shot? Competition lends itself to development and improvement. If the development of a dog with all these qualities is the sincere aim, it would appear that the early establishment of this sort of trial would serve this goal.

Let us look at the Brittany in another way. Is it not foolish to think that a

30-pound dog can outrun and out-hunt 50 pounds of raw-boned pointer? Or, if you are somewhat of a non-conformist and have taught your Brittany to retrieve, isn't it wishful thinking to believe he can buck waves in the same manner as a 60 pound Labrador? On the other hand, it has been my experience that the little Brittany will point far better than the Labrador and will work water like a champion when compared to the pointer. It must be recognized that the Brittany is not a specialist, but a completely versatile hunting dog. As such he should be developed; bred and trained for this class he has no peer. As a contemporary of the specialist he is doomed to be relegated to the position of mediocrity. and will never gain the stature and recognition he so truly deserves.



SCOUT OF EDOUGH C. D.

On 29 March 58 the International Kennel Club of Chicago held its field demonstration which this year was won by a Brittany Spaniel, Scout of Edough.

This trial was held indoors and the field was arranged to simulate actual outside hunting conditions. Live pheasants were used. The dogs were allowed 6 minutes in the field and blanks were fired over the dog on point.

The entry of 15 included many of the pointing breeds. A German Drathaar placed second and a pointer third.

NATIONAL COMMITTEE PROGRAM

Charles W. Morse

Your National Committee is composed of the following: Charles W. Morse, Chairman; John W. Lee, Field Trial Chairman; Henry A. Holleyoak, Show Chairman; Ruth E. Lee, Chairman of Reporting; Marcelle Bell, Trophy Chairman; George E. Millar, Futurity Chairman; Jack F. Secor, ABC President; and Dr. S. Allen Truex, ABC Secretary.

Since assuming office, many problems have presented themselves to the committee. First, there are the usual arrangements for the National Show and Trial. The progress on these to date, will be reported in separate articles by the respective chairmen.

Perhaps, the toughest problem to solve was the Field Trial Schedule. With our rapid growth to thirty active clubs, it was necessary to divide the country into four separate circuits. Thus, your field trial committee was able to arrange a workable schedule eliminating conflicting dates within a circuit, and still adhere to all state conservation laws. Except for a few necessary changes to erase undesirable date conflictions, all clubs have their regular dates. Future field trial schedules will be forwarded to regional secretaries one year in advance, in order to allow all clubs ample time to complete their trial arrangements.

During the past year, we have received many requests from regional officers for the names of experienced Brittany Field Trial Judges. In order to give equal service to every club, your committee decided to compile a list of all Brittany field judges throughout the entire country. Every regional was contacted for their suggestions as to judges who should appear on this list. Thus far 14 clubs have responded, and a partial list has been forwarded to all regional secretaries. As more suggestions are received, a supplementary list will be compiled. With the aid of every regional, we hope to keep this list current at all times.

Though your committee has been kept busy (after all, that is our function), the lack of work necessary to arrange show dates has caused quite a bit of concern. This past year, only five clubs requested show dates. Of these five, only one held their Specialty Show in connection with their field trial. This is something we would like to see occur more often—Specialty Shows in conjunction with our Field Trials. The lack of these two events being held together is quite disturbing. Does it mean we are no longer interested in the Dual Dog-that we are drifting in the direction of other sporting breeds—a separate show type and a separate field type. We hope not. The founders of our breed club in this country dedicated themselves to keeping our little Brittany a DUAL DOG. They succeeded, and thus we are able to point with pride to the fact that our Brittany is the only DUAL PURPOSE DOG in the Sporting Group TODAY.

Many of you will ask, "How do we get started on holding a "License Show?" Actually the procedure is much the same as securing your field trial

license. You must first hold two Sanction Matches at least six months apart. These are run much the same as a regular point show except that the catalog may be typed or mimeographed instead of printed. You must secure approval of AKC for your date. This application must be accompanied by ABC letter of approval and the necessary fee. Official AKC entry blanks must be used and the match conducted under AKC

match rules. At conclusion of match regular judges' books accompanied by all entry forms and a marked catalog must be filed with AKC. Upon completion of two successful matches of this type you will then be granted a show license by AKC. Any clubs desiring more complete information, please contact the writer. He sure hopes he is swamped with requests.

LUND'S RANDY OF TROY

Lund's Randy of Troy died on his fourth birthday at the start of what promised to be an outstanding field trial career.

Randy completed his bench championship and C. D. X. before the age of two. Trained by his owner Ejner Lund, he was a consistent threat at any field trial. His bench show activities resulted in 15 B of B, 11 BOS, and one group placement. He had 12 field trial placements, including a win in all breed trial. These field trial placements were primarily earned as a young dog after which he was completely incapacitated for a year with arthritis. Last fall he unbelievably recovered sufficiently to be entered in the field trials and won several places, narrowly missing two firsts. At the close of the hunting season he developed leptospirosis to end his exciting career.

The 16th National Specialty Show will be held at Carbondale, Illinois, on November 29, 1958.


Each regional club has been asked to select a member of the show committee and they in turn will select a suitable judge who is well acquainted with our standard—a standard written for a field dog of good conformation.



Yes, I really goofed last issue and missed the new closing date completely. So better late than never. Here are the summaries of the fall of 1957.

Top honors among the youngsters were divided between two dogs. Holliday Britt, futurity winner, who placed in both Open All-Age and Amateur stakes as well as winning derbies. The other youngster is Juchoir's Light Lodestar, who broke all existing records for a puppy on the West Coast and nationally annexed third place in the all-time puppy records. Her record was beaten only by Chic and Destin de Klemanor, both out of Mistie de Klemanor. Other youngsters were Taffy, owned by Doc Blair, who did consistent placing in the Midwest. Pacolet's Genii lived up to Jane Thompson's prediction that this was the best pup she had yet seen and got three firsts. Juchoir's Song of the South, also in the Thompson string, accounted for three firsts. Ferd's Flag of Leeway topped a winning season with a futurity placement. Brittchester's Sneaky Pete again won honors for the Bur-

In the older dogs Belloaks Ibby (now Dual Champ) cleaned up for top place. Pressing her closely was the MacWhorter's Buena Vista Beau. The Mac's have supported trials since their start on the West Coast. Mac's Cornouaille King, a newcomer to the winners circle, and owner-handler tied Beau for second. Nice going for a first winning season. Sir Ted finished his championship in a blaze of glory, handled by Russ Cook. Lund's Randy of

Troy was completely owner-trained and handled, Lund's first bird dog. Last year he was stricken with arthritis and given up as incurable. But the Lunds carefully nursed him back to health so he could be among the season's top winners. His recent death was a blow, as he was a fine Dual type dog. Stevenson got his Helgramite Tarquinius in quite a few times. Jefferson of Minnehaha completed his title. Jeff is the first South Dakota bred and owned Champ. Also completing her championship the bitch with the name, Dwight's Hallowe'en Spook. As wins are compiled on Official AKC point trials Benjji of La Rue with three firsts doesn't quite make this list, but he also managed to win a FDSB recognized Brittany Grouse Championship, so special mention to him.

Belloaks King is now a Dual. With a Dual sire and dam and three Dual grandparents, doubt if his pedigree can be equalled. Bells own King and his Dual ma, Ibby.

First time a trial postponed. Colorado had too much snow last spring and had to put the trial off till a later date. Sorry to see our first club go on the inactive list. Old Dominion, having lost its spark plug, seems to be the first club to fold. A kennel name much in the winners column lately, Siouxland. . Jippo la Chasseur won his title. Much credit to owner-handler Squires, who didn't leave the state of Michigan to accomplish the deed . . . The last 8 places that Torchy of Lionheart II has won are all firsts . . . Liver and white boosters note! All the first place

winners at Saginaw were liver and white.

New grounds at Ohio. Just east of bird field was a soy bean field and a watchful farmer. Woe betide any Britt who set foot in his beans. Cost Steve an extra \$3 to run Tarq and John Lee had to cough up for Ferdy, too. But wasn't it worth it, John? Ferdy retired the Tom Talbott Trophy, which I swear was five feet tall and the most elaborate I ever saw. As this was Ferdy's third leg, John and Ruth get to keep it permanently.

Glad to see two former winners back on the circuit under new owners. Hero's Master Spot is winning for Crippen and Gagel's Dutchman for Cormican.

The only dog that came to a trial in a fire engine: Chasseur Breton made the trip to Oregon on the front seat of a brand new fire engine that Hec

Pratt was delivering.

Now for this spring. Because of Ruth Lee's new chart of winners it will no longer be necessary to mention all the winners with more than 4 ribbons. Only the few top ones will rate mention now. The top 3 youngsters this season are all West Coast dogs. Wins in the rest of the country were pretty well spread around. Top dog is the Sullivan owned, Busteed bred, liver and white, Rochette of Richmont. Watch for her in the Futurity. Tie for second between Randy's Ranger and Juchoir's Harpo. Ranger broke the ice for the Lunds by winning their first blue ribbon at Washington. Were those tears Gilda! Between Harpo and his other derbies, Burgwin won all the derbies out here but one. The other better youngsters were two Pacolet dogs, Genii and Gallant Lad, and Dingo's Gizmo. Seems like it's the same old familiar kennel names in the top lists every season!

Stevenson and Helgramite Shamandre are in a class by themselves. A combination of derby and all-age wins leaves me in doubt which group to include him with. If memory serves

me right, only three other dogs, Pontac's Dingo, Juchoir's Martin and Prairie Rambler Topper, have won first in Derby and Open all-age in the same season. Stevenson (can't get away from that guy and his dogs) also won second slot in the older dogs with Tarquinius. Next comes Clement's Rendezvous Elias. There's a man that guns very heavily over his dogs and makes top trial winners of them, too. Who says a 'meat' dog is no good in trials? The other all-age of note is also a 'meat' dog par excellence, Ouragan Jerry's Bob, who is just coming into his prime at four years of age.

Ginny Morse knocked them cold at Ohio by winning the Amateur with Corky. Thought Chuck said she never could run the dog again after she lost him in the '57 Nationals.

The Michigan trial was unique in that the whole gang ate and slept at the former country estate of the Fords. It was charming, contributed much to good fellowship, but sleeping was at a minimum, partly on account of liquid refreshments being offered till the wee small hours and partly because sleeping was dormitory style.

The Fred Whites brought the dogs, kids and pony to Hoosier. Both kids got spilled when pony decided to kick the big horses but they didn't seem to mind. Doc Cormican consigned his very expensive camera to the grounds. Slipped off somewhere and it was like looking for a needle in a haystack. If you want to win the reward money it's still there! Ferdy took off after deer and there were some harried handlers for 45 minutes or so till he was found, as this is where Becky's Pete met his end also after deer.

Another Oklahoma field champion is Sooner Ranger, as he is registered in AKC, or if you prefer Thunderbird, which is his FDSB name. Doctor Joe of Kaymore finished at Pinehurst to make Kaymore's first Dual. He's a fine gundog. You should have seen Doc Sullivan at Oregon, loading trophies in his new station wagon. (Seems the

old car needed a couple of new tires, so Doc thought it was easier just to get a new car). Besides all those his own dogs won, he handled Mon Ami Michael (that the Sullivans bred) to finish his championship for owner Dave Neitzel. Everett Metzger had the fun of finishing his Evergray's Tic Toc Bobby at Washington. This was the first time he had handled him in Open competition though had won several Amateur stakes with the dog. That first place open all-age is a nice one to get. Gladjoe's Pride had 3 firsts this season to finish.

Top dog on the West Coast Amateur Trophy so far this year is Beau Kiki. Top for the East Coast Amateur Trophy is Belloaks Gunner, well recovered from his operation that put him out of the running last season.

The latest news tells us that Tommy's Yankee Ike also won a derby and an open all-age stake this spring. And Way Kan Sally did some very nice winning for owner Jerry Price. Prairie Rambler's Topper is now sporting the title of Champion.

Did this ever happen before? Every single dog in the open all-age at North California (all 15 of them) had finished manners on their birds. That

gave the judges a problem!

Time to review the top ten again. Producers first. Uno's Jet (who died last season) leads with 25 winners. Pontac's Dingo is second with 23. Next, and top living sire, is the liver and white Tex of Richmont. More than half his winners are out of Rube of Edough. Pierrot de Fontaine Vallee, also still living, has 18. Next follows a tie for 17 with Kaer de Cornouaille and Allamuchy Valley Warrior. And with 16 each are Avono Hapte, Idoc de Cornouaille, Allamuchy Valley Uno and Wippy de la Vallee Bourrault.

The top ten field winners are Helgramite Howie d'Acajou with 61 wins. Second is Pierrot de Fontaine Vallee with 48. Third is Ashurst Jerry with 36. A newcomer in 4th place, Ferdinand of Leeway with 32. Fifth is

Meadowink Buzz with 30. Britt of Blaisy Bas and Wippy de la Vallee Bourrault tie with 29. Uno's Jet had 28, Uno's Rex of Paradise 27, and Hero's Master Spot 26. Last place is a tie between Dingo's Little Mike, Evergrays Tic Toc Bobby, Belloaks Gunner and Belloaks Ibby (who is the only female on the list).

In analyzing these lists the winners-producers that appear on both lists are Uno's Jet, Pierrot de Fontaine Vallee and Wippy de la Vallee Bourrault. It is also of interest to note that ALL the dogs on these lists are closely related to Kaer de Cornouaille except Howie, who is very distantly related; Britt of Blaisy Bas, totally unrelated to any dog; Warrior, Wippy and Tex all go back to the three littermates, Tudor, Tosh, and Thais du Roc Hellou. It is also interesting to note Uno, his son Jet and Jet's son Uno's Rex, while Warrior and Tex are also father and son.

In the top winning dams Jule of Loufel has finally been surpassed by Ruby of Edough. Ruby has produced from two sires. Jule from three. Tied with Jule is Judith de Ferncroft, producing from two sires. Prices Lady Kaer is next. And a four way tie between FT. Ch. Joyeaux Jakqueline (only field winner on this list), Lettic de Pradalan, Berenda Creek Patti and Fantastico of Richmont completes the list.

MRS. LOIS J. HATFIELD

Mrs. Lois J. Hatfield, 33 years old, died May 2, 1958, after an illness of 2½ years. Lois had been a member of the Midwest Brittany Club for a number of years and had attended trials and other club functions recently, even though critically ill.

Lois leaves a small son, David, 2 years old, and her husband, Earl, an officer of the Midwest Club in 1957.

Even though small in stature, she was a giant in devotion to her family and friends.

STEPS TO FOLLOW IN FORMING A NEW REGIONAL BRITTANY CLUB

Fred Z. White, M.D.

A new regional club will probably start as a small group of Brittany enthusiasts who enjoy running showing their dogs together. This group will probably be in an area that is not already serviced by an existing regional club. The group may then decide to organize in a small, unofficial manner, have meetings to discuss training or other problems, and perhaps hold fun trials. If they can then see the development of further interest and potential enough to insure lasting cooperation and enthusiasm, they are ready to consider seeking recognition as a regional Brittany Club.

Procedure in organizing a new Regional Club:

- 1. Separate applications must be submitted to the American Kennel Club and the American Brittany Club; applications must be accompanied by:
 - a. A complete membership list of all members, showing the names and addresses of each of the members, and their activity with the Brittany, i.e., breeding, owning, showing, or running field trials, and those owning litters of Brittany Spaniels.
 - A copy of the Constitution and By-Laws of the proposed organization.
 - c. A rather complete history of the new organization, as to how it got started, and how long it has been in operation.
 - d. The location of the proposed field trial grounds.
 - e. A list of the officers.

- f. Name of the club; and location of the club. The new club should be pin-pointed to a particular location which is its home, and its membership list should be made up of people from that home and nearby areas. Application to the American Brittany Club directed to the Second Vice-President must be accompanied by the same documents as required by the American Kennel Club. In addition, the constitution and by-laws of the American Brittany Club require:
 - 1. Application to the American Brittany Club must be accompanied by a signed application applying for membership in this association from each member of a regional club, along with a check to cover all per capita dues. Ten members is the required minimum although more is advisable
 - 2. The American Brittany Club further requires under its constitution, that the new regional be incorporated as a non-profit corporation under the laws of the state in which it is to operate.
 - 3. The neighboring clubs, as a matter of courtesy should be contacted and informed of the formation of the new organization. Much can be learned from clubs already in operation and mutual interest and support of our neighbors' activities can be fostered in this manner.

To meet these requirements, the group should have an organizational meeting and elect officers. The neighboring regional clubs should be contacted for their approval. Model Constitution and By-Laws as well as the national Constitution and By-Laws may be obtained from the parent club, as well as application blanks. The second Vice-President of the American Brittany Club is in charge of membership and formation of the new clubs, and should be contacted for this and any other needs. The Constitution and By-Laws should be modified to meet the needs of the group and accepted by them.

With all the material assembled, separate application should simultaneously be made to American Brittany Club and American Kennel Club. If all requirements are satisfactorily met, the American Brittany Club will, following a favorable vote by the board of directors, make recommendation for acceptance to the American Kennel Club. If the American Kennel Club

then accepts the regional club, application for sanctioned field trials or specialty shows will be entertained by the American Kennel Club, and the American Brittany Club field trial committee will work the new regional into the National schedule.

The American Kennel Club and the American Brittany Club expect any new club to be the result of a spontaneous outgrowth of extraordinary interest on the part of dog people in the area. The new club like the parent club and the American Kennel Club should plainly and earnestly intend to serve the best interests of the breed and the community and not be used as a promotional activity for any individual or small group.

For these reasons, the above requirements have been established and the fledgling regional should realize that each step has a definite purpose. Things will move faster if approached in the proper manner, in the right order, and with a great deal of patience.

STANDARD OF THE BRITTANY SPANIEL AS APPROVED BY THE AMERICAN KENNEL CLUB

General Description

A compact, closely knit dog of medium size, a leggy spaniel having the appearance as well as the agility of a great ground coverer. Strong, vigorous, energetic and quick of movement. Not too light in bone, yet never heavy boned and cumbersome. Ruggedness, without clumsiness, is a characteristic of the breed. So leggy is he that his height at the withers is the same as the length of his body. He has no tail, or at most, not more than four inches.

Weight

Should weigh between 30 and 40 pounds.

Height

17½ to 20½ inches—measured from the ground to the highest point of the back—the withers.

Disqualification

Any Brittany spaniel measuring under 17½" or over 20½" shall be disqualified from bench show competition. Any black in the coat, or a nose so dark in color as to appear black, shall disqualify. A tail substantially more than four inches in length shall disqualify.

Coat

Hair dense, flat or wavy, never curly. Not as fine as in other spaniel breeds, and never silky. Furnishings not profuse. The ears should carry little fringe. Neither the front nor hind legs should carry heavy featherings.

Note: Long, curly, or silky hair is a fault. Any tendency toward excessive feathering should be severely penalized, as undesirable in a sporting dog which must face burrs and heavy cover.

Skin

Fine and fairly loose. (A loose skin rolls with briars and sticks, thus diminishing punctures or tearing. But a skin so loose as to form pouches is undesirable).

Color

Dark orange and white, or liver and white. Some ticking is desirable, but not so much as to produce belton patterns. Roan patterns or factors of orange or liver shade are permissible. The orange and liver are found in standard parti-color, or piebald patterns. Washed out or faded colors are not desirable. Black is a disqualification.

Skull

Medium length (approximately 43/4 inches). Rounded, very slightly wedge shaped, but evenly made. Width, not quite as wide as the length (about 43/8 inches) and never so broad as to appear coarse, or so narrow as to appear racy. Well defined, but gently sloping stop effect. Median line rather indistinct. The occipital crest only apparent to the touch. Lateral walls well rounded. The Brittany should never be "apple headed" and he should never have an indented stop. (All measurements of skull are for a 191/2 inch dog).

Muzzle

Medium length, about two thirds the length of the skull, measuring the muzzle from the tip to the stop, and the skull from the occipital crest to the stop between the eyes. Muzzle should taper gradually in both horizontal and vertical dimensions as it approaches the nostrils. Neither a Roman nose nor a concave curve (dish face) is desirable. Never broad, heavy, or snipy.

Nose

Nostrils well open to permit deep breathing of air and adequate scenting while at top speed. Tight nostrils should be penalized. Never shiny. Color fawn, tan, light shades of brown, or deep pink. A black nose is a disqualification. A two-tone or butterfly nose should be severely penalized.

Eyes

Well set in head. Well protected from briars by a heavy, expressive eyebrow. A prominent, full, or pop eye should be heavily penalized. It is a serious fault in a hunting dog who must face briars. Skull well chiseled under the eyes, so that the lower lid is not pulled back to form a pocket or haw for catching seeds, dirt and weed dust. Judges should check by forcing head down to see if lid falls away from the eye. Preference should be for darker colored eyes, though lighter shades of amber should not be penalized. Light and mean looking eyes to be heavily penalized.

Ears

Set high, above the level of the eyes. Short and leafy, rather than pendulous, reaching about half the length of the muzzle. Should lie flat and close to the head, with the tip rounded very slightly. Ears well covered with dense, but relatively short hair, and with little fringe.

Lips

Tight to the muzzle, with the upper lip overlapping the lower jaw only

sufficiently to cover under lip. Lips dry so that feathers do not stick. Drooling to receive a heavy penalty. Flews to be penalized.

Teeth

Well joined incisors. Posterior edge of upper incisors in contact with anterior edge of lower incisors, thus giving a true scissors bite. Overshot or undershot jaw to be penalized heavily.

Neck

Medium length. Not quite permitting the dog to place his nose on the ground without bending his legs. Free from throatiness, though not a serious fault unless accompanied by dewlaps. Strong, without giving the impression of being over-muscled. Well set into sloping shoulders. Never concave or ewe-necked.

Body Length

Approximately the same as the height when measured at the withers. Body length is measured from the point of the forechest to the rear of the haunches. A long body should be heavily penalized.

Withers

Shoulder blades should not protrude much. Not too widely set apart with perhaps two thumbs' width or less between the blades. At the withers, the Brittany is slightly higher than at the rump.

Shoulders

Sloping and muscular. Blade and upper arm should form nearly a 90 degree angle when measured from the posterior point of the blade at the withers to the junction of the blade and upper arm, and thence to the point of the elbow nearest the ribs. Straight shoulders do not permit sufficient reach.

Back

Short and straight. Slight slope from highest point of withers to the root of the tail. Never hollow, saddle, sway or roached backed. Slight drop from hips to root of tail. Distance from last rib to upper thigh short, about three to four finger widths.

Chest

Deep, reaching the level of the elbow. Neither so wide nor so rounded as to disturb the placement of the shoulder bones and elbows, which causes a paddling movement, and often causes soreness from elbow striking ribs. Ribs well sprung, but adequate heart room provided by depth as well as width. Narrow or slab sided chests are a fault.

Flanks

Rounded. Fairly full. Not extremely tucked up, nor yet flabby and falling. Loins short and strong. Narrow and weak loins are a fault. In motion the loin should not sway sideways, giving a zigzag motion to the back, wasting energy.

Hindquarters

Broad, strong and muscular, with powerful thighs and well bent stifles, giving a hip set well into the loin and the marked angulation necessary for a powerful drive when in motion. Fat and falling hindquarters are a fault.

Tail

Naturally tailless, or not over four inches long. Natural or docked. Set on high, actually an extension of the spine at about the same level.

Front Legs

Viewed from the front, perpendicular, but not set too wide as in the case of a dog loaded in shoulder. Elbows and feet turning neither in nor out. Viewed from the side, practically perpendicular to the pastern. Pastern slightly bent to give cushion to stride. Not so straight as in terriers. Falling pasterns, however, are a serious fault. Leg bones clean, graceful, but not too fine. An extremely heavy bone is as much a fault as spindly legs. One must look for substance and suppleness. Height to the elbows should approximately equal the distance from elbow to withers.

Hind Legs

Stifles well bent. The stifle generally

is the term used for knee joint. If the angle made by the upper and lower leg bones is too straight, the dog quite generally lacks drive, since his hind legs cannot drive as far forward at each stride as is desirable. However, the stifle should not be bent as to throw the hock joint far out behind the dog. Since factors not easily seen by the eye may give the dog his proper drive, a Brittany should not be condemned for straight stifle until the judge has checked the dog in motion from the side. When at a trot, the Brittany's hind foot should step into or beyond the print left by the front foot.

The stifle joint should not turn out making a cow hock. (The cow hock moves the foot out to the side, thus driving out of line, and losing reach at each stride). Thighs well-feathered, but not profusely, half way to the hock. Hocks, that is, the back pasterns, should be moderately short, pointing neither in nor out; perpendicular when viewed from the side. They should be firm when shaken by the judge.

Feet

Should be strong, proportionately smaller than other spaniels, with close fitting, well arched toes and thick pads. The Brittany is not "up on his toes." Toes not heavily feathered. Flat feet, splayed feet, paper feet, etc., are to be heavily penalized. An ideal foot is half way between the hare and cat foot.

A Guide To The Judge

The points below indicate only relative values. To be also taken into consideration are type, gait, soundness, spirit, optimum height, body length and general proportions.

Reasons for Disqualification

Any Brittany Spaniel measuring under 17½" or over 20½". Any black in the coat or a nose so dark in the color as to appear black. A tail substantially more than 4" in length.

THE NORTHEASTERN BRITTANY CLUB AMATEUR GUN DOG STAKE

Andrew J. Foster

Many amateur members of our various Brittany Clubs prefer to train and work their dogs during hunting seasons in the serious search for gamebirds, and object to the judging of their dogs when entered in Amateur or Open All-Age stakes on accepted and prescribed Field Trial Standards.

Mr. Ruben Jeffrey, the organizing force behind the Upper New York Brittany Club, recognized this situation early in the history of the Club, and he took steps to rectify it.

In January of 1956, at the annual trial at Pinehurst, North Carolina, the Northeastern Brittany Clubs, comprising: The North Jersey Brittany Club, The Brittany Club of Upper New York, The Central New England Brittany Club and The Southern New England Brittany Club, represented by Messrs. Ted Cwik, W. E. Stevenson for Ruben Jeffrey, Phil Morehouse, Andrew J. Foster of the Southern New England Brittany Club, and Walter Kleeman of the National Club, met to discuss and to formulate a program to encourage and foster greater amateur participation in field trials in the area covered by the respective clubs.

It was recognized that the participating members of the Northeastern Brittany Clubs are largely amateur. The geographical location of the Clubs, unfortunately, does not permit the at-

tendance of many of the professional handlers with a number of dogs to enter the various stakes and insure a large field. The amateur members, therefore, must be encouraged to attend and to participate in the trials of each of the other clubs, thus maintaining a maximum entry and the promotion of enthusiasm for growth. The inclusion of an Amateur Gun Dog Stake by A.K.C. in Brittany field trials, to be optionally run, instead of the All-Age Stake, seemed to offer further inducement for amateur members to attend and run their dogs in the field trials. To encourage the many members, and to provide a continuing incentive, it was proposed to include the Amateur Gun Dog Stake in each of the Spring and Fall field trial schedules. The judging of the stake was to follow the A.K.C. prescribed pattern.

It was proposed that a trophy be offered each year, for the dog which could amass the most points during eight trials—four Spring and four Fall. A runner-up trophy was likewise to be awarded on the same point basis. It was agreed that the points would be awarded separately from those prescribed by A.K.C., but would follow the same pattern except that points would be awarded to a second, a third, and a fourth place dog. A.K.C. awards five points to a winner for a stake involving twenty-five dogs or more. Five

points would likewise be awarded to the winner dog to apply against the N.B.C.A.G.D. trophy. However, the second dog would receive four points, the third three points and the fourth dog two points. If, however, the stake were small, eight to twelve dogs, where A.K.C. awarded two points to the winner, the N.B.C.A.G.D. trophy award would be two points for first place, one point for second place, none for third or fourth. The size of the stake would determine the point award. The handler whose dog was consistently in the upper four places could win the trophy award over the flash winner in a few trials. Consistent attendance at trials, hence, was likewise rewarded.

It was proposed that each of the named clubs contribute 50 cents to the trophy fund for each entry received in its previous Fall field trial. It was agreed that Sterling Silver Paul Revere bowls, costing in the order of \$125.00 would be provided as winner and runner-up trophies. In the event of a tie in the total point score at the end of each year, two trophies would be awarded, each appropriately engraved, bearing the names of both handlers and both dogs. The four respective clubs would obligate themselves to provide the added funds proportionately. Each club would determine how this contribution was to be collected within itself. A display card setting forth the point standing to date was to be displayed at each trial. A sheet showing the point standing was to be mailed to each member before the Fall schedule began and a final standing of the scores was to be mailed at the close of the season.

The plan was an immediate success. The eight stakes run in 1956 provided not only the highest of competition and excitement, but the number of entries in each trial was most surprising. Delegations from each of the clubs attended the trials in force. Amateur handlers who could not be present sent along their dogs with fellow members so

that no opportunity to place in a stake was overlooked.

The last race of the last trial in 1956, which was held in New Jersey, was a storybook finish. W. E. Stevenson's Doc and Dick Fox's Bell Oaks Gunner were tied for first place. Stevenson was out first and as usual put on quite a show—with a covey find on the back course, and a single or so in the bird field—BUT, with seconds to go, a running bird confused the outcome. It was Dick Fox's turn, and, as the minutes ticked away, the report came back that there had also been a covey find on the back course, which alerted everyone for a climactic finish —and a climactic one it proved to be. The long row of brush at the right of the bird field was crawling with quail. In spite of this Gunner contained his enthusiasm and with the judges "pick 'em up" proved himself the winner.

The 1957 circuit was equally spectacular. Mid-season, Fox's Gunner led, with Stevenson's and Marcelle Bell's entries right behind, followed by six other dogs—all of which were real threats. Marcelle Bell's Bell Oaks Ibby took the first two Fall meets which made the going very tough. Fox's Bell Oaks Gunner was taken sick and was forced out of competition. Along came Bill Stevenson with Helgramite Tinker and led his father going into the last trial by two points for runners-up. Unfortunately the last trial did not provide a large stake. However it was large enough for Stevenson's Helgramite Tarquinius to acquire two points for first place and tie with Helgramite Tinker for second. In the meantime Marcelle Bell had acquired seventeen points for first and Bell Oaks Gunner, out of competition in the Fall series, was third. Eight other dogs participated in the final scoring.

Thus the second year of the Northeastern Brittany Clubs Amateur Gun Dog Stake came to a close. The program has proven itself successful and has provided much fun, enthusiasm and keen competition over the entire time. January '58 should prove no exception.

CENTRAL NEW ENGLAND BRITTANY CLUB Bob Burbank

The state-owned grounds at Westboro, Mass., April 26-27, was the scene of the first presentation of the Dual Champion Brit of Bellows Falls Trophy. I was formally introduced to this fine Brittany several years ago and will never forget his quiet dignity in the knowledge that he had the distinction of being the first dual champion Brittany in this country.

It was most fitting that the first dog to win the trophy was the outstanding Field Champion Belloak's Gunner, owned and handled by Richard Fox of Orleans, Mass.

Quail again went into deep hiding in the running of this stake, and only two dogs had initial contact with game. Three dogs were called back in a second series.

Fld. Ch. Saxon of Fredan topped his first series attempt with stop to flush and covey find. Rendezvous Elias battled uphill to second place with a strange handler who did not look wide enough for "Pete's" birds, so relocation ended in a stop to flush. Pete de Klemanor was outstanding in ground coverage on his initial bid, but failed

to capitalize on contacting birds in his second attempt. A "handler-handicap" was Fld. Ch. Joey of Hunterhaven's fate when he found birds in a fencerow.

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

GAME MANAGEMENT CLUB

R. H. Ellis

One of our club activities which is greatly enjoyed and participated in by many is a Game Management Club. It is like other game management areas of the State of California with the exception that the membership is limited to Northern California Brittany Club members only.

The club is run by Elmer and Virginia Flack of Arbuckle, California, and the hunting grounds, consisting of approximately 1,000 acres, are located just outside the town of Arbuckle. The operator of a game management area must release 100 birds for every 80 shot. The supervision of the banding and releasing of birds, and licensing of these clubs are handled by the California State Fish and Game Commission. For a full membership fee of \$220 a member is allowed to shoot 40 pheasants, either cocks or hens, during a period of approximately 75 days, usually from about November 1 to January 15.

The advantages of a game management area are the longer season and controlled hunting grounds which are never too crowded (with the exception of the Cook Shack). The limited membership makes it even more enjoyable from the social standpoint. The members usually get together at noontime for a lunch made up of food contributed by those attending for the day.

The stories of great shots and dogs are plenty at these sessions, especially if the hunter has been in an area with no witnesses. Occasionally he is interrupted with, "How come you fired 10 times and only have two birds?"

Several times during the season a pheasant barbecue is held on a Saturday night in town. The pheasants and trimmings are donated by the members. These are usually well attended, the last one with 70 members and guests, and a wonderful time was had by all.

It has been our experience that not all members of a club have the dogs, the time or the money to campaign in or attend point field trials and shows. Yet they make enthusiastic Brittany supporters if activities are available in which they can participate. Although not in actual competition these dogs are performing under similar conditions. Their ability to find and handle game will soon become apparent and comparisons of performance will be inevitable.

Past breeding will show in their performance, and future breeding will be influenced by it.

Such a program not only maintains club interest and participation at a high level but improves training and breeding programs with more potential field trial dogs as a result.

This has brought in some skunks and the Game Commission has been working on destroying the skunks before the nesting season. As a result a few dogs made contact with either live or dead skunks which at times filled the air with a typical aroma. On the area is a large pond where feeding of migratory birds takes place and during the late hours of the day it was most interesting to see the large flocks of ducks swinging over the area and into the pond for their evening meal.

The trial opened Saturday morning with nice weather, which continued throughout and was particularly enjoyed by the large gallery which followed the dogs. The area is crisscrossed with roadways so that those of the gallery who preferred the comfort of an automobile could also see a great part of the running. We appreciated the large contingent attending from both California and Washington, all of which made the trial a success. The banquet at the Albany Hotel was well attended along with the social hour preceding.

We were fortunate in having Mr. Ronald Masters of Yakima, Washington, who has judged many of the larger trials throughout the country with us and Mr. Arthur Smith of Aberdeen, Washington, who is also an excellent judge of a bird dog.

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




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
