

AN EDITORIAL

It has been called to our attention that the masthead of this magazine no longer carries the information that it formerly did which read as follows:

The purpose of this Club is to promote cooperation and friends among the breeders and owners of Brittany Spaniels and to encourage higher standards in breeding, training and showing of Brittany Spaniels, in the field and in the show ring, to discourage the breed from becoming split into groups of "field dogs" and "bench dogs" and to strive to keep it forever a "dual dog."

This creed of the American Brittany Club is a worthy one. It was deleted, as were several repetitive items to make room for more varied material. Perhaps this was the wrong thing to do. Perhaps our members need reminding each month that we are striving to keep the Brittany forever a "dual dog." Perhaps we were wrong in assuming that an extra page of varied material was more important than repeating this creed each month. Perhaps we should omit the page on show results and new champions, or the page that deals with the results of your field trial and reprint this creed each month.

We feel that the deed is more important than the word. We feel that we do not want to waste space paying lip service to the creed. Instead, we want to live up to the ideal of the club by publishing more items that concern the dual aspects of the breed. We want to balance more fully the material so that the field does not dominate this magazine and so the bench is equally represented.

Therefore, we dedicate this August issue to the "dual dog." May he become a reality instead of just a dream.

AND AN ARTICLE

Here are a few facts about the dual dog. There have been 62 who have gained this title through the spring of 1966; of these, 15 were females.

The first dual was Brit of Bellows Falls whose title was confirmed some time after his wins were made. In the early days trials were run under the American Field. When the American Brittany Club affiliated with the AKC it was allowed to compile reports of trials that had been run previously and to submit such reports to the AKC for confirmation. These reports gave Brit the needed ten points for his championship in the field.

The youngest dual was finished last year. This one is a female, Joel's Drole, who completed her championship in both field and bench by the time she was just 2 years and 10 months of age. Most dual titles are completed in a range of from just over three years to six years old.

A few of our duals have placed in show groups, which should prove that they are a cut above the average dual. These were, in order of their placings, Pierrot de Fontaine Vallee, Amos of Edough, Holley Haven Duchess, Penelope de Evanston, Freckles VII, Lund's Trooper, Uno's Chief and Kaymore's Dapper Dan.

Duals who have won the National Championship or its equivalent (the open all-age at the Nationals before it was recognized as a championship) are Aotrou MacEochaidh, Pontac's Dingo, who won two years in a row, and Towsey, who won three times in all.

The National Amateur has been won by Holley Haven Duchess, Saxon of Fredan, Belloaks King, and Tigar's Jocko.

Only one Futurity winner has completed his dual title—Dingo's Little Mike.

A list of those duals who have had placements in trials of national stature would be too lengthy to give here as many of our duals have made outstanding field wins. Many more hold excellent records as producers of both field and bench winners.

THE *Dual* CONCEPT

The best minds of dogdom have puzzled over the problem of the Dual Purpose dog for more generations than anyone can remember; have puzzled over it, and for the most part, failed to solve it.

Yet a strong, active parent club, which is introducing a purely working breed to the sporting public, ought to be able to keep a breed in the dual purpose category. But it can be done only if the parent club draws a tight standard in which double meanings aren't possible; in which inter-club bickerings are suppressed, and in which bench and field activities are sponsored equally.

Each Brittany breeder ought to know the tragic history of other breeds. And each new fancier ought to be taught a thorough history of the breed; the desires and aims of that breed; and the failures of the others. It is a sad commentary on other breeds that only one breeder of ten has even an elementary history of his breed, and that only one judge of ten knows either the breed history or the aims of it.

The present Brittany standard gives maximum and minimum heights, with a "tolerance" allowance. But it ought to make disqualification mandatory for dogs exceeding certain weights or heights. (Which has been done since this article was written. Ed's note.)

The reason: Bench breeders and judges inevitably tend toward excessive bone, heads too heavy for work, but beautiful, etc. And as in the boxing ring, good big dogs tend to beat good small dogs, regardless of the standard.

Consider Spring Spaniels. The rule says "18½ inches, give or take a half inch." Yet, the greatest winner of all time is 21 inches or so. And in fact, most of the great winning Springers have been too big, according to the standard, and according to hunting experience.

Bench shows are a sport in themselves, and tend to exist for themselves alone. Breeders of bench dogs seldom have time and money to train for the field too, or vice versa. And many breeders will live in areas where field trials are forbidden by law or impracticable to hold.

So you can't make field winning a condition of winning a bench championship, particularly in a country so big as the United States. What you must do is make the strongest possible standard, one that penalizes over bone as much as under bone, and one that can be interpreted in only the desired way.

Unsuccessful bench breeders tend to advertise and sell their unworthy stock as "field dogs" because they can't compete on the bench. Similarly sold are untrained or horribly trained dog, whose owners couldn't prepare their dogs for field trials.

Only study of pedigrees and the breed history, and only constant education and advertising to show that given bloodlines produce dual winners, even if not in the same dog, can curb this.

Field trials also tend to exist for themselves alone. Dogs tend to get faster, the work more exacting, the demands greater and even artificial. Why? Relative speed and training supersede satisfactory work.

The dogs are competing against each other, and the judges are looking for workmanship. So, before you know it, winning qualifications have gone far beyond the point which the amateur can hope to reach. The accent becomes solely a matter of speed and training.

These considerations have split the pointer and setter breeds into three parts—bench dog, shooting dog, field trial dog, with shooting dogs ranging from terrible to beautifully trained companions to hunters.

Washington

SPRING TRIAL

The annual spring field trial of the Washington Brittany Club was held on the Scatter Creek Grounds near Rochester, Washington. The early fog on Saturday lifted to reveal Mt. Ranier in all of its 14,410 foot glory and the nice weather held throughout the trial. The Scatter Creek area is being developed by the Washington State Game Department for a Dog Training and Public Hunting Area. The amateur dog trainer may use the grounds for training but the pro may not.

A strong entry of 86 dogs in five stakes kept the committee busy. Thanks go to Joe and Nora Ganje, Dick Malzahn and Don Faulkner for their hard work. The trial ran like clockwork and finished in good time.

Officials were delighted with the entry of so many puppies. Thirteen of the twenty-four were from new puppy owners who had never even seen a field trial before. It is hoped that all will enter again. Several were very enthusiastic.

The first four braces of the Amateur All-Age were fantastic. All eight dogs came through clean as far as bird work. As you may guess the four winners came from these braces.

Judge Schoonover was quoted as saying that the Open Derby was one of the most outstanding he had judged. The winner, Seawash Tommy's Jacques, will be one to watch in the future. Never was an owner more excited than Dr. Johnson.

The Open All-Age winner's owner was particularly enthusiastic also. It was one of his first attempts at handling his own dog in the All-Age and he was elated to come out one notch higher than the sire of his dog—a notable feat to beat the mighty Trooper.

The Open Gun Dog entry was split fairly evenly between the Britts and the GSPs but the winners column leaned more heavily towards the German breed.

Chairman Dave Story wished to express his appreciation to the committee members, owners, and handlers, all of whom helped to make the trial a success.



I do not know what the solution to the latter problem is, unless it be stakes designed mainly for champions, but open to other dogs. Today, for instance, a bird dog or spaniel trainer may have four or five champions in his string.

This is particularly true of the spaniels. The presence of these dogs, trained by professionals on great private game preserves, discourages the amateur, shoots championship quality far beyond his reach, and drops him into the shooting dog class.

If champions were barred from stakes carrying championship recognition this situation might not hold. But the super stakes would have to be left open for those owners of dogs who had the courage and sportsmanship enough to compete against the champions.



Trial Talk

Here are the figures for the Spring 1966 trial season. Wins in AKC trials only are counted. Every dog with 4 ribbons or more is mentioned.

The top winning young dog is an Okie, **Boy's Rusty**, owned by Mike Melot. Rusty has 8 placements (5 firsts and 3 seconds) and quite a story behind them. He is Mike's first bird dog. Mike had never campaigned a dog or even been in the gallery at a field trial when he and Rusty took their first plunge. They came out with a ribbon and a desire, which took them right to the top this spring. We would guess that this is the first time that a rank novice handler has come through with the top dog in the US. So all ye timid-hearted take heed; it can be done.

A duo closely on Rusty's heels. The outstanding derby, **Jeanne of Flanagan**, came through with 7 places (3 of them firsts). Though the derby stakes were small this spring it is no mean feat to get that many blues. Congratulations to the Holmans who handle her and to Bertha Cullen who owns her. Jeanne shared honors with **Kate's Kando Kotton**, who is owner handled. Her wins were all in the Puppy and most of them in large stakes. Her owner, Terry Stamper, deserves high honors as do her breeders, the Pittmans.

With 6 places were two dogs. **Britnipper's Pokydot Gus** is another Holman puppy product. His sire, **Rendezvous Gus**, must have watched with pride as this fast stepping son of his came down the stretch for so many wins. **Lord Brit of Stony Manor**, a Johnson handled dog, also made his six all in the Derby. Here is one you want to watch for the future. He is owned by W. Pfitzinger.

The group gets larger when we get down to those with 5 places. **Nys Britt's Corker**, owned by Ed Nys and Holman handled, was a consistent placing Derby. He comes from good dual type stock. **Skysan** is a Thompson product. This son of Sandy Bottom Kid won 3 Puppy firsts and made two Derby placements also.

The two top young dogs on the West Coast were **Sandy of Bear Creek** and **Taylor's Trooper's Wild Ace**. Sandy made only one placement in Brittany trials. He went as high as an Amateur first in mixed breed AKC competition. Wild Ace won two Puppy Stakes and made his mark in several others.

The only young dog on the East Coast circuit to make this list is **Jock Scott of Big Meadow** who had four ribbons in the Derby. He is Morehouse handled.

In the far West three dogs had four placements apiece. **Black Butte's Ace Wild** (several times braced with the above Wild Ace dog) has been in the ribbons at every trial in which his owner handled him. **Jocko's High Gun** is novice handled and very impressive with his Puppy and Derby placements. **Kiki's Cisco** is the latest Phillips entry and if we know Linus we will be hearing more from this dog.

The central part of the country had several dogs with four placements. **Antoine de la Mont** was a consistent placer in Derby Stakes. **Bonine Benjji Mike** is Herman Bonine's latest Puppy winner. **Le Bon Papillon**, formerly owned by Dr. Bolton, and now under the banner of Dewey Mullins, did well with several handlers. **Royal Trouble** (now there's a name for a dog!) was trouble for his competitors and a joy to owner Harold Adams. And last we have **Spartan Town Red**, a Derby, bred by his owner, Wayne Croxton, and handled by the Holmans.

Now for the older dogs. George Wilson hit the top with his Buddy dog, **De Little Frenchman**. They took home 9 trophies but that one Open All-Age still eludes them. No stake was over until this team had shown their wares. They are to be watched in the future as this dog hits his stride. It must be a pleasure for George to handle this winning son of his old Dual, Dingo's Little Mike.

There is a three way tie for second place with 3 unusual performances. **Destry** is only a Derby dog but he performs equally well in the Derby for his handler, Johnson, or in the Amateur for his owner, Vulgamore. His record of 18 placements to date means that he will be one to reckon with later on. **Spicks on Mugho Hill** is another one who is pressing closely to his championship with just one elusive Open All-Age to go. The unusual factor in his spring record is that he was handled by young (13 year old) John Gleason, Jr., who took him to wins in both the Minnesota and Ringneck trials. **Way Kan Jeff** started the season with a placement at Pinehurst in the Quail Classic under handler Johnson, followed with a placement in the Pheasant Classic under handler Holcomb, and spiced the overall performance with Amateur ribbons when handled by Art Stavik.

Four dogs came out of the spring with 7 ribbons. The top eastern dog was **Sparkles Towsey of Lombard** who was right in there pitching for his owner-handler J. J. Longobardi. At the other end of the country E. L. Phillips piloted **Gary's Beau Kiki** through another successful season. (We have mentioned these two so often that we have run out of things to say about them.) **Buddy Boy VII** (was that Roman numeral an omen?) missed the record that his winning son, Boy's Rusty, made by just one placement. Boy was prominent in all-breed events in the Texas-Oklahoma area. **Morning Star Rambler** made owner Nicholson proud by finishing his championship, handled by the Holmans. We expect great things from this dog.

Now for the six time winners. **Lund's Trooper** is working his way toward the hundred mark. A quick count of his record seems to show that he has 37 placements to date. **Heady's Skip Brit** joins his winning daughter on these lists. (At least we think Kotton is female). We hope Brit is recovering from his illness and will be able to run again. It would be a shame to lose the competition of a dog who had 3 firsts in the Open and a Classics placement in this one season.

Now we are at the five mark. There is a new Dual, **Lewis's Ringo**. He had to

do his the hard way, all in the All-Age. But he came through with flying colors and we may all be proud of our newest Dual. **Tipco's French Rebel** is knocking at the door. One more Open win and he can stand up there beside Ringo. **Butch Dandy's Gunsmoke** is another regular to this column. This season he made enough points to complete a second championship. **Longtown** is a fine bird dog and we are happy to congratulate his owner, Wr. Wilder, on his championship and publicly apologize for them-there words we said some years ago. **Rusty de Morningside** carried the banner for the livers with wins under both his handler, Johnson, and his owner, Dr. Glover. **Towsey's White Alawar** can finish with one big Open win. He is making a fine record for his new owner, Stan Judd.

And the ones who have four—**Helgramite Howie**, another who needs an Open for the dual title. **Molko's Mike de Jacques** ditto. **Pompton Falls Copeau** won his first points. **Evergray's Tic Toc Timmy** is as stylish a Britt is we ever saw on birds. **Checkers Cracker Jack** in his first season out made his presence felt under the whistle of Ralph Hesselstine. Another Hesselstine dog. **Pierre le Chasseur** racked up his finishing points by winning an Amateur Stake for Dr. Utzinger. **Little Ra Pa Luke** did really well to the joy of his lady owner, Dr. Edna Cree. **Stephen's Lord Lucky** is another new champion. Congratulations, Paul Bailey. Lucky is an impressive bird finder.

If the owners of the dogs who have been omitted will let me know we will give them a write-up next month.

The dog who was pictured on the April 1966 cover, Laskar de St. Tuguen, has become a field champion and won the 1966 French Championship title.

First place puppy in the Northern New York Shorthair trials was **M's Mandy**, owned by Dr. Fred and Mrs. Taylor and handled by Hank Martinet. Mandy was the only Brittany to place among the 8 who started in this stake.

At the Champaign County Club's trial the lone Brittany entered in the trial came away with a third in the Member's Amateur Shooting Dog Stake. **Champaign Tony Boy** was the dog, and his owner-handler was Roger James.

Spirited Rusty, owned and handled by Mike Borkowski, was the winner of the Restricted Breed Open Puppy Stake at the Western Illinois trials.

At the Southern Wisconsin trials under judge Gene Brown **Kickapoo Tygo** did a bang-up job in the Derby Stake to win the blue ribbon. Tygo was also mentioned in the Open Shooting Dog as impressive. Second in the Derby, to make it one-two for the Britts was **Bonnie**, owned and handled by Dick Belshaw.

The above mentioned **Bonnie** made another placement, a third, in the Derby Stake at the West Allis Club trials held in April at the Bong Air Base grounds. She was owner-handled in this event also.

Dot of Britt Vick was the only Brittany to break into the winners' circle at the Hilltop Club's trials held at the Desplaines area near Joliet, Illinois, in early spring. She was guided into a third in the Amateur Shooting Dog by her owner, John Agazzi.

Gentile-Homme Tartuffe, owned by W. Ziegler has won his CD in 3 consecutive shows. Out of a possible 200 points

he scored 193 at Yakima, 185 at Olympia and 180 at Tacoma.

The Ottawa Valley trials found Brittannies entered in all 6 stakes. **Jaybee's Little Princess**, owned by Jack Bradley and handled by his wife, Glenda, won the Open Shooting Dog. **Kipewa's Island Boy** was second in the Restricted Breed Derby. Boy was handled and is owned by A. Code. Little Princess also knocked off a second place in the Open All-Age, sandwiched in between a pointer and a setter.

Princess was declared winner of the Best Member's Dog Award.

It was a big 22 dog entry at the Delaware Club's trials—a lone Brittany against 21 longtails. We are proud to report that **Sparkles Towsey of Lombard** came through clean with two finds and a nice back to garner second in this quality field. He was handled by his owner, Joseph Longobardi.

Some of you may have been wondering what your ex-editor Fred White has been doing recently. Promoting the dual dog, that's what. Fredan Kennels recently completed the bench championships of three of their dogs. One of these, **Fredan's Buddy**, is the Whites' second Dual Champion, and completed his bench championship with only one defeat. This gives the Whites a total of 2 duals and 3 bench championships completed.

Crab Orchard Leeway, one of the better puppies in the central-midwest circuit in 1963 recently died of cancer.

The Southern University of Wildlife Research Laboratory Staff is right on the ball. What do they use for their quail census taking?—A Brittany, of course.

Judging the trial held by the Vizsla Club of America was Ron Lisius of Camache, Iowa, who officiated in the Derby and Amateur Gun Dog Stakes.

Capturing first place in the Arrowhead Shooting Dog Stake was **Ramblin' Rex of Handjem**, owned and handled by Bill Cunningham. This win was omitted in the previous report of this trial. Rex took the traveling trophy and the first place trophy. It is interesting to note that of the other 3 Britts placing in this trial two were sons of Rex and a third was his grandson.

Midwest is happy to report that it still has a secretary. And happy to report that a bunch of very smart Brittanies are still living to tell the tale. Just a few minutes before storm warnings were issued on the radio on June 8th Estle Bales' Brittanies began kicking up such a fuss that Marge (Mrs. Bales) went out and brought them all into the cellar. This probably saved them as the tornado struck a few minutes later. The dogs pens were nearly leveled by falling telephone poles, loose rooftops and other flying debris.

The Bales did not fare very well. The tornado took the roof off their house and did other extensive damage. All the club records, including the minutes of the original Midwest meeting, were lost. The club typewriter and mimeograph were blown away. The typewriter was later found beyond repair. The roof was never located.

No one in their home was injured but many of their neighbors were not so fortunate. One lost her life, Another had a broken arm which Estle placed in a splint for the night as they were unable to get to a hospital due to all streets being blocked by debris.

Mrs. Blanche Bales was with her brother-in-law during the storm, also taking refuge in the cellar.

At such a time a sense of humor certainly helps. We are told that Marge came up from the basement and burst out laughing. She told Estle that she had always wanted more light in a certain closet and now they had it.

George Wilson and his committee welcomed 92 dogs and their owners or handlers to run under four capable judges; Arthur Fruchy, Edenville, Michigan; Walter Bublitz, Bay City, Michigan; Ralph Warrington, Grand Blanc, Michigan, and Earl Cutler, Inkster, Mich.

Amos Greer had the stage all set Saturday morning when the first brace of 35 dogs were run. The last brace in the stake brought in the first place winner and made a new Dual Champion of Holley Haven Casey, owned by Henry Holleyoak, Wayne, Mich., and run by Lee Holman. Casey ran a really classy race, and had two perfect finds and a good back. What grandstanding!! Dr. Edna Cree's Little Ra-Pa-Luke came back to Michigan to capture second place honors. Little Luke was really fired up and ran a brilliant backcourse, had two steady finds and a stop to flush. He needed a little more cautioning when handling his birds than the first place dog. Third place went to Rusty de Morningside, owned by Dr. R. M. Glover, Newton, Kansas, and handled by Lyle Johnson, of Goddard, Kansas. Rusty was another good running dog, having a good backcourse, two steady finds and hunting well all the way. Fourth place was awarded to Longtown, owned by Dr. W. Wiggins Wilder, of Germantown, Tenn., and handled by Lee Holman. Longtown ran a fair race and had three good finds. The birdwork in this stake was plentiful and showed our Brittanies to good advantage.

Saturday night's dinner and festivities included the awarding of the All-Age trophies. Despite Henry Holleyoak's long-time experience in winning in both bench and field, he was obviously very happy in obtaining his second dual champion dog. The judges also express-

ed their appreciation of the great work done by the dogs and their handlers. And, again, the Greers did a magnificent job hosting the dinner at the Gladwin Golf Club.

There were 15 Derby entries. First place was awarded to Jeanne of Flanagan, owned by Bertha Cullen, Flanagan, Ill., and handled by Lee Holman. Second place went to Lord Britt of Stoney Manor, owned by W. H. Pfitzinger of Kirkwood, Mo., and handled by Lyle Johnson. Third went to Nys Britts Corker, owned by Ed Nys of Plymouth, Mich., a Michigan club member, and handled by Lee Holman. Fourth place went to Stoney Island Jeff II, owned by F. C. Ash, Fulton, N.Y., and handled by Jane Thompson, Seney, Mich. Everyone is looking for potential threats for the next fall's futurity when they watch this stake.

Lyle Johnson's pups were really a threat for he won three of the four places in the Puppy stake. First place winner was Holley Haven Irma La Deuce, owned by J. Wallace, of Chilli-cothe, Ill., and handled by Lyle Johnson. Second place went to a Pennsylvania dog, Chartiers Valley Sam, owned by Sewall. The Amateur stake is always the favorite of club members to watch and on which to speculate. This time George Wilson's De Little Frenchman came in with first place honors. This classy dog has quite a bit going for him with Dingo's Little Mike his father and George Wilson as his trainer. This should be a good combination. Coming in second place was an 8 year old veteran

of many trials, Sewall's Rex, owned and handled by Glenn Sewall, a winning combination again. Third place winner was Ch. Holley Haven Casey, owned by Henry Holleyoak, and handled this time by Glenn Sewall, a very capable amateur handler who captured three placements for his efforts in this trial. Fourth place was won by Fld. Ch. Lady's Hasty Nell, owned and handled by William Hughes, Swartz Creek, Michigan.

Everyone was happy at the end of the trial, including almost all the losers. George Wilson, Amos Greer, Art Parker, Al Vogt, Bill Huff, Bill Hughes, and others, did an excellent job. The Dual Dog

WHAT AND WHY

What is the dual dog? It doesn't mean a land and water dog, or a pheasant and rabbit dog. It means a dog who is a field performer and who also has the confirmation to compete in bench shows.

Other breeds have lost this dual ideal. Today's working dog seldom looks enough like his show counterpart to be recognizable as the same breed. The hunting English Setter is a good example of how far apart two strains of the same breed can be. He is small, racy, almost all white, with tail held straight to the sky. The show Setter is large, heavy, big boned, belton marked with tail level with the back. The working sheep dog seldom resembles his bench-tie brother.

Only the Brittany, the German Short-haired Pointer and to a minor extent the Labrador and Weimaraner can boast a goodly number of dual dogs. Brittanies have finished more dual championships than the other breeds. The latest count shows that 62 dogs have made this title. Fifteen of this number have been bitches.

Why the dual dog? Does it matter what a field dog looks like? Does it matter that a show dog hunt? What relation does the bench standard have to field dogs?

To strive for a dual dog is to try and keep alive the ideals of the founders of the breed, to breed a hunting dog that looks like a Brittany. The goal is to keep producing good hunting dogs that don't look like half setters, or half hounds but like the Brittany Spaniel.

The breed has gained its popularity as a hunting dog. If we breed for show only, the dog loses his purpose, his market and his popularity.

Brittanies are blessed with a bench standard that was composed by bench show men who were also hunters. Each part of the standard has a reason for being. And many of these reasons have their roots in field work.

The Brittany's size is set so that he is big enough to withstand a hard day in heavy cover. Small and weedy dogs are undesirable. His length of leg serves to help him negotiate hard going. The standard calls for a rugged dog, built so that he will give you a strong day's hunt. Oversize is undesirable as then the dog approaches the setter in size and build and may range too much or be clumsy and lumbering in his movements.

The coat is very important. It helps to make the Brittany look like a Brittany. If it is of correct texture and length it will shed burrs to a great extent. A soft and silky coat holds burrs. A wavy coat with profuse feathering is a nuisance in a field of cockle burrs. Too short a coat leaves the skin unprotected and makes the dog hesitant to go in briars. There should be enough coat to protect the dog.

His fairly loose skin will roll with the briars. Again this saves him from briar scratches.

Even the dark colors called for help in the field. A dog who is marked with clear white and dark orange or dark liver patches will stand out when on point while you might still be looking for the lemon and white dog who blends with his surroundings.

The standards that cover the shape of the head have no use except to help identify the breed. A non-typical head often brings the remark that the dog must be part Brittany for he looks something like one.

The breadth of nostrils insures that the dog will be able to breathe freely and scent birds easily.

The eye is most important. Those who have had trouble with seeds in the eye know that loose skin below the eyes is an annoyance. The eye color insures a friendly expression in the dog.

The mouth and teeth specifications

insure you a dog that can hold a bird properly and can carry it to you. It also insures you a healthy dog as a dog with malfunctioning teeth may have trouble chewing and digesting his food.

The length of body and length and set of legs ask for a dog who can run all day without tiring. A dog who has crooked legs, too long or too short, a body which is not properly proportioned will tire more easily. He is like the short-legged child who tries to keep up to his long-legged brothers, or like the man who is pigeon-toed and whose feet ache after a short walk.

The depth of chest insures plenty of room for lungs.

The natural bob tail means that there are few troubles with whipped and bloody tails. If you have owned pointers you know what problem this is in stiff cover with a dog with a merry tail.

The feet call for a type that will take plenty of punishment, that have cushion enough to take the jar out of running.

It seems that there is reason for a dual dog and that it is possible to retain the dual type for the bench standards

call for qualifications that the field dog needs.

Let us watch the direction that the breed is taking. Among the first 60 field champions 24 were duals. In recent years a count of 60 field champions shows only 9 were duals. We must try and stop this trend.

Admittedly the dual dog is only an ideal and the great bench dog who is also a great field dog is yet to be born. A few individuals have almost touched the ideal but most of the duals are superior field individuals who manage to make a bench championship by much campaigning. Some have been good both field and bench but missed greatness in both areas.

A good bench and field dog is all most breeders may hope to accomplish, and when they do they should be proud of their efforts. If each breeder is able to breed a good looking dog who will hunt we can be assured that the breed will prosper. Let us strive for this ideal and hope that one day the pattern of genes will fall right so that that mythical national champion can be a best in show winning dog.

SPRING TRIAL

The Oregon Brittany Club's Annual Spring Trial was held on March 19-20 over the E. E. Wilson Game Management's Camp Adair Grounds. This trial followed the running of the American Brittany Club's National Pheasant Classic. Like a prize fight where the preliminary bouts are held after the main event. It is axiomatic that there was a let down in enthusiasm.

The weather man failed to cooperate and much of Saturday's and Sunday's running was in a cold wind driven rain. The field trial committee was faced with a much larger entry in the Puppy Stake than was anticipated and had to move this stake to a part of the grounds where it would not interfere with the running of the Open All-Age Stake. The two stakes were then run simultaneously.

The desirability of good bird work in a field trial is to be taken for granted and there are times when dogs are able to place themselves by their outstanding performance. When this happens judges are relieved of the labor of fine analysis that is required to distinguish the performance of dogs running over multiple courses. But when such is not the case, a club is fortunate when it has selected judges of sharp perception, who candidly name the winners in the order of their observations. Judging was in the capable hands of Barney McPhillips, Tom Burke, John Keels and Mike Burgwin.

Clean cut bird work was predominate in the Open All-Age. Dual Ch. Way Kan Jeff topped the field with a laudable ground heat and one good find on pheasant. This was Jeff's finest performance on these grounds. He can be counted as one of the few dogs capable of handling Camp Adair pheasants.

Evergray's Tic-Toc Timmy put down a wide searching race for second place, styling up beautifully on his one find. Timmy is the type of Brittany that goes out and finds his birds.

Dual Ch. Ultra Mend Maisie had a pleasing ground race covering all the birdy spots. She was credited with an excellent find on a covey of quail and had one stop to flush.

Fourth was Dual Ch. Tigar's Jocko. Jocko was level and consistent and his one find was handled flawlessly.

The Open Puppy Stake was run over an improvised one-course venue. Juc-O-Tufmis, Jr., showed a lot of range and speed to take first. Taylordale's Tic-Toc Tiger laid down a fine ground pattern running to the front all the way to take second. Third was Idabritt's Desert Sand with a liking for the heavy cover. Cindy's Chico Diablo hunted hard and showed much promise to take fourth.

Fld. Ch. Evergray's Tic-Toc Tommy II won the Amateur All-Age Stake on a second series decision. Tommy ran a tremendously wide race the first time down. He failed to make the turn at the north end of the No. 1 course and his handler was hard put to bring him around. Once back on course he finished wide and strong but failed to contact birds. Brought back to run with the bye dog Tommy scored a find in which his brace mate also was involved. He was shot over and ordered up.

Evergray's Tic-Toc Timmy cast out boldly, choosing the outside route, running with the fire and drive of a young-

ster. He had one find on a group of several pheasant which he handled with finesse. An error on the part of his handler probably cost this youngster the top spot.

Dual Ch. Lund's Trooper was birdless in his first series. Called back he promptly took third with a find on pheasant.

Fourth place was withheld.

Juchoir's Trooper Jill ran a well sustained pattern with pleasing style and drive to take first in the Open Derby. She had several contacts with birds but did not show maturity on birds.

Count's Dandy Lad ranged moderately to the front for the most part. He pointed briefly with a pheasant flushing some distance to the side and rear. His application left something to be desired.

Third was Black Butte's Ace Wild. Ace went hunting on the breakaway, showed well at times, but his bird work lacked clarity.

Fourth was Gaard's Tic-Toc Huguenot. Huey started slow and was bothered by a trailing brace mate that was finally picked up. He wound up his heat with some far reaching casts and might have been higher in the stake had he started with more punch.

The first place dog had not been fired over in the field and to satisfy the new rules the dog was taken out into the field and shot over. Her response was satisfactory.

Hall of Fame

SEMI-ANNUAL *Report* OF THE A.B.C.

Memberships are up for 1966 about 100 over the previous year.

Three ballots have been sent to the Board of Directors. The first, making the qualifications for the National Trial less stringent, was passed with 3 opposed to the requirements for the Championship; one opposed and one abstaining for the Amateur.

The second ballot was on transferring funds from the general fund to the book fund in order to pay outstanding bills. This money will later be returned to the general fund. The ballot was unanimously in favor of this move.

The third ballot authorized payment of expenses for the Long Range Planning Committee to meet at a central point. It also contained a ballot for authorizing a flyer advertising the Brittany Spaniel. The flyer was unanimously accepted. The vote on expenses passed but showed 4 opposed to this expenditure.

Generally the health of the Brittany Club is good and things are rolling smoothly.

The nominations for dogs to run this fall in the Futurity are coming in and a full report will be made after the deadline, August 1st. The 20th-5th Futurity whose nominations closed July 1st show that there are about 150 litters nominated for the Field and 100 for the Bench. There is still two weeks for stragglers to make their first nomination at the time this is being written so the total may go slightly higher.

Slight changes in the Futurity rules are being contemplated; ones that will make the bookwork a little easier and the rules simpler for those who will nominate litters.

The bench standards committee has presented the proposed changes in the standard to the AKC. Minor objections were raised by that body. We have heard that AKC is satisfied with the committee's answers and that the pro-

posed changes will be published in the official AKC magazine soon.

The field trial committee has nearly completed the fall trial schedule though one minor change is still being worked on. The field trial committee chairman requests that you start thinking about your spring date. If possible all spring dates should be firmed up by late October. This means that tentative schedules must be drawn up soon.

The Grouse Classic will be held by the Central New England Club in early November. The 1967 Quail Classic will be hosted by the Kentucky Club. For the first time the Pheasant Classic moves east and will be held at the Baldwinville grounds, hosted by Upper New York. The 1967 Grouse Classic has not been decided upon as yet.

The National Trials and Show Committee is functioning. Names of proposed field judges have been sent to the committee for approval. The general layout of the trial has been made and the complete program will be announced at a suitable time. The show judge will be announced as soon as his approval is received from the AKC.

The Trophy Committee has received a few donations but many more are needed. Your check will be appreciated. See notice elsewhere in this magazine as to address to send donations to.

The Long Range Planning Committee had a very successful meeting in June. Reports are now being sent to the Board with recommendations. As soon as opinions are received from the Board announcements will be made of any changes.

The magazine is being mailed for arrival the first of each month. More pages have been printed in each issue this year. We are trying to present varied material that will appeal to trialers, show people, and just hunters. Articles are needed badly on any subject related to the Brittany Spaniel.

WASP STINGS

Now is the time to beware, especially when puppies are around, of wasps. Should a dog be so unlucky as to be stung by one of these pests, almost instant relief and reduction of swelling can be obtained by dabbing the spot with plain vinegar. The acetic acid of the vinegar neutralizes the acid in the insect's sting. Apply baking soda later.

HOW TO

Ruin

A BIRD DOG

by Jessie Ford and Allen Truex

And lo; the hunting season is over, the voice of the turtle is heard throughout the land and summer treads upon the heels of spring. The "ruining season" for bird dogs is at hand. The canine friend, that bird-finding hero and companion of the cold months, finds himself shut away like the hunter's coat and gun. Let us look in on the dog and hear what he has to say. Our reporter calls on a Brittany Spaniel at his summer quarters. The place is stifling hot, the poor dog has no fresh water. He has not been fed since yesterday.

Reporter.

"How are you?"

Dog:

"How am I? Can't you see for yourself? It's summer again—Golly, how I hate summers. Do you think I've seen my master in a week? Does he ever let me out of this stinking pen? No! Look at my ribs—I've already gained six pounds! My joints are stiff. Could you get me a drink of water?"

Reporter:

(Filling dog's filthy watering pan.)
"My assignment was to write a sketch on how to ruin a bird dog."

Dog:

(After he has lapped up the water.)
"Brother you came to the right place. All you have to do to ruin a bird dog is treat him like I'm being treated. First you put him in his kennel, next you overfeed and under exercise him. Finally you never take him out into the field to let him run—that is until bird season opens again. And do you know what's happened by then?"

Reporter:

"No. What?"

Dog:

"By then the poor dog's forgotten how a bird smells. He's so fat he's almost blind before he's run a mile. He hasn't been brushed all summer, his coat's a wreck—he's, well, he's ruined, that's all. And what's just about as bad, his master is in the same shape. His master

looks cardiac green before he and that ruined dog have been out hunting two hours. And you want to know how to ruin a bird dog."

The reporter gets his story. He has only to listen to the whining of the poor dog to understand all of the techniques for ruining a good bird dog, but after his notes are complete he cannot resist letting the poor fat dog out of his overheated kennel. After getting a little exercise the dog comes back and gives this advice for dog owners. Our reporter respectfully jots down the following notes.

Dog's Advice To Owners

Dog:

"Some years ago a firearms manufacturer sent my master a little booklet of instructions on deer hunting. The gist of the thing was this. The deer hunter should begin his preparations in the spring before the deer season opens in the winter following. First he should buy himself a comfortable pair of boots and begin walking in them every day. The first day he should walk a mile, the second day two miles, and so on, until by mid summer he is able to walk fifteen miles without getting particularly tired. In August he throws the worn out pair of boots away and gets a new pair like them. He breaks this second pair of boots in the same way—by walking. When the deer season opens in November, he is ready. The point is that he's in shape."

Reporter:

"Go on."

Dog:

"This principle applies to dogs as well as men. The dog's master should begin right after one hunting season getting ready for the next one. He should concentrate on improving a good bird dog instead of ruining one. If he will take the dog out for longer and longer practice hunts he will be ready when hunting season comes. The dog's master will be able to hunt without running the risk of a heart attack and the dog will remember what birds smell like and will know where and how to find them. Both members of the hunting team will be in shape. Being in shape is of primary importance. How many a hunter has arrived behind a

dog on point only to find himself so winded and tired, lacking completely the necessary coordination, that he couldn't place a shot within ten feet of a flying bird!

"Of secondary importance only to the physical condition is that mutual understanding between the two hunters. This is what makes it all worth while. If my master would let know how fast he wishes to go or what his commands mean, we would form a team and not two separate hunters, each going his own way. Even a Rebel yell that would make my blood run cold even in July, would be permissible during the hunting season if I had been subjected to it previously.

"And of course the dog isn't going to be in shape if he hasn't been brushed regularly. His coat must be tough to shed the briars and the skin must be in a good healthy condition, free from all sores. He isn't going to hunt well if




