# Quail Classic

Rendezvous Skipper, white and orange dog, owned and handled by L. D. LaFleur of Bloomingdale, Ill., topped a class field of 31 dogs to take top honors in the annual running of the American Brittany Club Quail Classic which was concluded on Thursday, January 12, over the grounds of the West Kentucky Wildlife Management Area near Grahamville, Kentucky.

Kruger's Captain Thrap, owned by E. C. Kruger of Fairbury, Nebraska, and handled by Lyle Johnson, was awarded second place in the stake. Third place went to Destry, owned by Pat Vulgamore of Wichita, Kansas, and was also handled by Lyle Johnson. Fourth was awarded to L. D. LaFleur's Rendezvous Gus, handled by Lee Holman.

The drawing was held at the Diplomat Motel on Monday night, January 9, and the running got under way on Tuesday morning, January 10. The running of the classic was followed by the four stake program of the Kentucky Brittany Club.

The weather was ideal throughout the running with the final day probably being the best of all. With the exception of Friday the sun was bright and it was cold enough to be fine for the dogs but not so cold as to be uncomfortable for the gallery. Friday brought a few clouds but no precipitation and it was a pleasant day to be afield.

The grounds lend themselves to the hunting pattern of the Brittany and the game supply and cover conditions made running near ideal. With plenty of open country to show and objectives to search the little dogs put on quite a show during the five days of the running.

The facilities at the Kentucky Wildlife Management Area add much to the running of trials on these grounds. The Club House where breakfast and lunch were served each day is a center for most activities. Presided over by Mrs. J. D. Boss, the hospitality and food are always a welcome event for the field

trialers who attend here. The kennels and barns add to the over-all excellence of this as an area over which to run class bird dogs.

Many distinguished visitors and handlers were present during the trial, and honors for coming the greatest distance go to Bert Barone of Manchester, Conn. Lloyd and Ella Conable came from Buffalo, New York, and Mr. and Mrs. Gerald Cohen from Marshall, Michigan. Ed Hoover, Ray Nickel and B. C. Nix were also on hand to represent the Michigan area. Mr. and Mrs. John Sawyer of Beaver Falls, Pa., made this a dual purpose trip. They attended church on Sunday in Saxon, Mo., just across the river, where they had been married 25 years before. So, congratulations! and a happy Silver Anniversary to Peg and John!

The judges, J. D. Boss of Kevil, Ky., and Walter Wimmer of Rockville, Ind., are familiar faces at Brittany trials.

## The Winner and Others

Winning is no novelty to Rendezvous Skipper as he annexed the National Open Championship as well as the National Amateur titles in 1966 to add to an already impressive list of achievements. He is a strong bird finder, knows how to hunt his country and looks good doing it. He is hunting all the way, makes his objectives with a real finesse and demonstrates that the decade of living that has transpired for him has been well spent in learning the ways of the wily Bob White. Skipper combined an unusually strong ground race with three class finds to top this stake. He scored his first find at 20 minutes and a second at 35 with the final contact coming at 55 minutes. He was still going strong at the end of the hour. He handled his game with the finish that is expected and his manners were without fault.

Kruger's Captain Thrap scored one excellent find and coupled this with an exceptionally strong ground pattern to take second honors in the event. Cap is

owned by E. C. Kruger of Fairbury, Nebraska, and was piloted by Lyle Johnson. Cap showed many of the fine traits of his distinguished sire, Towsey, the many time champion of a few years past, in annexing his honors in this stake.

Third honors went to Destry and this little dog really knows how to get out

and go. His enthusiasm is something to see and he really goes bird hunting as he moves through his country with determination to find birds and this he usually does. He had one excellent find at 25 minutes and backed his bracedmate at 45. In both instances his department was exemplary. These events coupled with an excellent ground pattern placed

him in the event with little margin between the second and third dogs.

In fourth place was Rendezvous Gus who scored one good find and had a good ground race for the hour. His ground effort was excellent and he sustained his pace well until the command to "pick 'em up."

Other dogs that showed to advantage were Bellewood Polly Ann who turned in an excellent performance with a good ground pattern and four game contacts but all were not perfectly handled, an excellent hunting effort that was well rewarded; Bucky Beaver, braced with Polly Ann, also turned in an excellent performance with two contacts and an excellent ground race but was charged with an unproductive; Joel's Copper Jacques had four contacts and an unproductive with a fair ground race and Le Bonabe scored two finds and had a fair to good ground pattern.

### The Running

**Hi Dolly Haven - Loufel's Chippewa Kaer.** There was frost on the ground and a chill in the air as the first brace was released at 7:45 a.m. on Tuesday. Dolly pointed along creek bank before crossing bridge at 15 minutes with Kaer backing. No birds were flushed and the pair continued to course with only fair range and pace for the remainder of the hour.

**Dusty's Little Tex - Rendezvous Skipper.** Tex scored first with a find at 15 minutes but broke on flush and was picked up. He was covering his country with a pleasing pace and pattern and doing a good hunting job up to the time of the incident. Skipper scored his first find at 20 minutes and handler rode up birds before discovering dog. He scored again at 35 minutes and this time birds were flushed with ease and Skipper was the epitome of style and proper deportment through the flush and shot episode. He continued to hunt with his third contact of the hour. He had his birds pinned with precision and his manners were excellent at flush and shot. He continued to move out with ease and enthusiasm for the remainder of the hour.

### Way Kan Jeff - Shenango Valley Dingo.

Both dogs started slow and disappeared into thicket where birds were flushed at 5 minutes. Jeff stopped but handler did not shoot. Jeff then pointed a single at 6 minutes and his manners were exemplary at flush and shot. Dingo did not score on game and neither dog impressed with their ground patterns.

### Destry - Baroness Allamuchy Babs.

Baroness was seen in area as birds were in the air but she did not stop. Both continued good searching patterns and Baroness scored a good find at 18 minutes with exemplary manners at flush and shot. Destry scored a find at 25 minutes and displayed the kind of manners that are most laudable at flush and shot. Baroness was charged with unproductive at 45 minutes and again at 50 minutes. Destry had a commendable ground effort with pleasing pace and pattern as well as an intelligent application. Baroness was not as driving but had a better than average ground effort.

**Worrelwind's Bucky Beaver - Bellewood's Polly Ann.** Polly Ann scored on game at 12 minutes with a good find and excellent manners at flush and shot. Beaver was charged with an unproductive at 20 minutes when he pointed along edge and birds could not be flushed. Polly Ann had a stop-to-flush at 25 minutes and conducted herself admirably under the circumstances. Beaver followed five minutes later with another stop-to-flush and conducted himself satisfactorily. Polly Ann scored a find at 42 minutes and was o.k. at flush and shot. Beaver scored again at 51

minutes and conducted himself satisfactorily at flush and shot. Polly Ann scored at 52 minutes with Beaver backing and both dogs were exemplary at flush and shot. Both had excellent hunting races and were really searching their country intelligently all the way.

**Le Bonabe - Tarry Not.** Le Bonabe scored first with a find at six minutes, with manners at flush and shot exemplary. Le Bonabe had a second contact at 15 minutes with Tarry Not backing and both dogs conducting themselves appropriately at flush and shot. Le Bonabe pointed again at 18 minutes with Tarry Not backing but this time birds could not be flushed and relocation efforts were futile. Tarry Not had a stop-to-flush at 31 and again at 40 minutes but this time he only stopped momentarily. Neither dog had adequate range and their pace and pattern were too restricted.

It was clear and cold on Wednesday morning with a heavy frost. The temperature was around 30 degrees with little wind as the first brace was released at 7:50 a.m.

**Kruger's Captain Thrap - Holly Haven Casey.** Cap drove out with excellent pace and pattern as well as range. He scored an excellent find at 20 minutes and his conduct at flush and shot were exemplary. He continued the searching pattern for the remainder of the hour without further success in contacting game but turned in one of the top ground efforts

of the trial. Casey failed to contact game and had a fair to above average ground pattern for the hour.

**Rendezvous Gus - Towsey's Bub.** Gus moved out and hit the edges in a searching manners from the first and was rewarded with a find at 20 minutes. He had his birds perfectly located and his deportment at flush and shot was laudable. He continued the hour's running with the same searching pattern but did not score on game again. His ground effort was excellent in both pace and pattern as well at range and application. Bub did not reach the same enthusiasm as Gus but scored a commendable find at 55 minutes and demonstrated the kind of manners that delight at flush and shot. His ground effort left something to be desired.

**Tearaway Broccho - Geronimo De Kazan.** Neither dog scored on game during the hour with Broccho pointing where birds had been seen to leave earlier. Geronimo had an excellent ground effort with that of Broccho at fair to average in rating.

**Elcon Shotgun Smoke - Clem of Helderberg.** Both dogs coursed well with Smoke covering his territory more thoroughly and attractively but neither scored until Clem made contact with a bevy 50 minutes. Smoke backed the effort and both dogs broke at flush. The hour ended without further incident.

**Hoover's Rusty Rogue - Joel's Copper Jacques.** Jacques had a stop-to-flush at 10 minutes and conducted himself satisfactorily. Rusty followed with a stop-to-flush at 20 minutes and deported himself laudibly. Jacques pointed at 22 but his location left something to be desired, otherwise, o.k. Jacques was charged with an unproductive at 45 and scored a find at 50 on which his manners were excellent at flush and shot. Rusty scored at 55 but Jacques failed to back. Rusty deported himself admirably at flush and shot. Neither dog had an adequate ground effort in terms of range but both were excellent in terms of application as game contacts indicate.

**Leeway's Skyline Charley - Kazan's Pecos Kid.** This pair covered a lot of country and Charley was charged with

bumping a bevy for the only game contact of the hour. Pecos Kid posed handling problems and was hard to keep to the front.

Thursday was bright and clear with a heavy frost as the first brace of the day was released at 7:45 a.m.

**La Petite Blanche - Longtown Sandy.**

Blanche opened with a driving cast that was a delight to see and at six minutes she scored on game with a point of a bevy along edge; however, she broke on flush and was picked up. Sandy scored at six and was o.k. and again at 25 but broke and was picked up to cut short the first hour's running of the final day.

**Gus's Jumping Dude - Jacques Pierre's Pride.** Neither dog scored on game and their ground patterns left something to be desired.

**Crab Orchard Maverick.** Maverick ran as a bye. He scored on game at 15 minutes but broke on flush and was picked up.

**Beauregard's Billy Boy.** Boy scored an exemplary find at 45 minutes and his manners were tops at flush and shot. His ground effort was only fair to average.

**Way Kan Mandy.** Mandy bumped a bevy just after breakaway and was picked up, thus ending the 1967 edition of the American Brittany Quail Classic.

## Dogs AT Cornell

In 1949, a group of dog owners approached officials of Cornell University and asked that research be undertaken to solve the problem of distemper which at that time was causing widespread destruction of dogs. They offered to provide funds for a study. Our conception of a solution to dog health problems was formation of a research center for thorough study. Accordingly, the Board of Trustees of Cornell University authorized construction of the Cornell Research Laboratory for Diseases of Dogs. Work began in the Laboratory in 1950.

Initially the major study was distemper complex, as it was called in 1950. Now, we no longer speak of distemper complex; infectious canine hepatitis as a separate disease was recognized. Procedures were developed which assured protection of a dog against distemper. A vaccine against infectious canine hepatitis was developed and combined with distemper vaccine to make the first dual vaccine ever used for man or animals. Distemper complex was solved.

But was the job of research for dogs fully done? Today there are still many problems on which we are working. Some of them include hip dysplasia which is a subject of great concern. A new virus has been discovered recently. Called herpesvirus, it has been shown to be responsible for deaths of young puppies and, because it produces vaginitis, it may explain some breeding problems. Incidence has shown this virus to be widespread. There must be continued

evaluation of measles vaccine which has been introduced to protect puppies against distemper during that period when successful immunization is uncertain because of interference from maternally transferred distemper antibodies. The effects of nutrition on resistance to disease is most important. A search for drugs to control viruses could mean better health for dogs. Eradication may be possible of some internal parasites that plague dogs. Solution of the distemper complex was a concentrated effort requiring only virologists; solutions of present problems require geneticists, nutritionists, pathologists, and parasitologists in addition to virologists.

Over the years since 1950, the Research Laboratory has grown. A new building for controlled rearing of more dogs and laboratory animals has been constructed. A laboratory for microbiology has been built. Much experimental equipment, necessary for modern research, has been purchased. Two endowed professorships have been established. Now an additional building has been planned with a completion date for September 1966. With the new addition, capital investment in terms of building and equipment will be about two million dollars.

Cornell University depends on annual giving for the operation of this Laboratory. This is why the Board of Directors has voted donations to Cornell in 1965 and 1966.

The Northwest Field Trial Council, an association of field trial clubs including Washington, Oregon, Idaho and British Columbia, have announced the winner of their Dog of the Year award. He is **American and Canadian Dual Ch. Way Kan Jeff**, owned by Mel Stavik and trained by Bob Holcomb. Jeff amassed more points than any dog who has previously won this award. Last year's winner of this award was also a Brittany.

A new name in the winner's column is **Highview Skipper** who was 3rd in the Open Shooting Dog in the Boone & Clark Club's trial held at Charlestown, Ind. Skip is owned and handled by R. Lamb.

**Annie's Ace of Hearts**, owned and handled by R. Almstrom got 3rd in the Amateur Derby at the Central Valley (Cal.) trials in December. It was a nice win.

Second in the puppy stake at the Ladner trial in B.C. in November was **Amer. and Canadian Ch. Coveymoor's Tigar Belle**, owned by the Foltzes and handled by Del Foltz. It bodes well for the breed when bench dogs can do so well in the field!

Have you read Herm David's column in *Sporting Dogs*? He states that there are only 3 dogs who have won American Field Championships in mixed breed company since the inception of trials. He lists Tom and Joe, Jr. (who won twice), both Irish Setters who won their titles in 1877 and 1878.

His statement that the next such title to be won was when the Brittany Tigar's Jocko won the National Amateur Pheasant Shooting Dog Championship in 1965 is incorrect. Jocko was the first to win a National title but not the first to win a Championship. In 1962 Sundown of Siouxsland won the Region 3 Amateur Championship held at Watertown, S.D. We hope Mr. David will publish a correction for we are rightly proud that two of our breed could come up with a big one in the pointer-setter trials.

Gerald Price writes that one of his "girls" is gone. **Fld. Ch. Lady Patsy** had been in failing health for the past couple of years so her demise was no surprise. She suffered a series of strokes and finally died on January 11th.

Patsy was one of the foundation stock of the Way Kan strain. She was out of Dual Ch. Amos of Edough and Lady Lou, born in June, 1952.

Patsy was campaigned with Lee Holman in her derby years winning firsts in Connecticut and Pennsylvania. She polished off her record with 4 5-point Open All-Age wins, and then a 3-point Amateur win when she was 10 years old. These 7 firsts topped her complete record which was 12 placements. Seldom can it be recalled when a bitch had this quality record!

How Patsy did it we will never know but she managed to have time to raise quality pups along with her field campaigning. She is noted as the dam of 14 winners, which makes her fourth in the all-time records as a producing dam. Among her most noted progeny are Brittchester's Sneaky Pete, Way Kan Gal, and Way Kan Judy. She was bred primarily to Jack of Dick Argard and Yankee Boy's Tommy.

At the newly formed Emerald Valley trials **Juchoir's Chocolate Candy**, owned and handled by Larry Prefountain, went home with the first place cash in the Open Shooting Dog. **Evergray's Tic Toc Timmy** was third in the Amateur Gun Dog while **T. L. Mati Hari** was first in the Derby followed closely in second by **Juc-O-Tufmis Laddie**, owned by Jim Rookard and handled by John Keels. Timmy is owned and handled by E. Metzger and Mati Hari is Ted Lee's pride and joy.

At the Southern California Shorthair trials the Open Gun Dog was won by a Brittany, **Les-Lee's Red Ryder**, owned by Dave LaChance and handled by John Merrell. Ryder also slipped into a 3rd in the Amateur Gun Dog under the whistle of his owner.

**Juchoir's Chocolate Candy** won another big one in the Willamette Club's trial by taking the Open Gun Dog. His daughter, **Chocolate Candy's Heide**, owned by R. Sossaman and handled by Dutch Morrill, was 3rd in the Derby here.

The 7th annual championship of the California club was held at the Las Flores Ranch on January 15th. Entries are limited to club members only. An entry of 29 in the regular stakes was very pleasing.



Although the over-all total entries were somewhat smaller than usual, our objective to increase the total points in the Amateur Gun and All-Age stakes, was accomplished.




**Taro of Magnum**

# Good DOGS RUN THE *Dark* SPOTS

by R. L. Cornwell

This one took me a while to decipher: At a pre-trial drawing a discussion was in progress regarding the desirability of the winning Derby being steady to point. One veteran Judge declared that he didn't hesitate to place a birdless Derby provided he ran well and ran the "dark spots." Later the judge explained dark spots by reminding me that sedgefields, grass lands, deserted farms, and other bird fields will produce patches and strips of lespedeza, beggar lice, partridge peas, and other nutritious weeds. After frost falls, these patches are darker than surrounding areas: hence "dark spots."

Instinct and experience tells the birds where food is found. Instinct and experience also tells the hunting dog where birds are found and that is where he does his hunting; not cow paths, tractor treads, harrow cuts, or crop rows. "Running the dark spots" simply means hunting instead of running for exercise.

Every hunter knows the slight change of pace, soft action, and bush sniffing that signals that his dog is loafing. The all day meat hunter does not expect old "Rip" to burn the wind continuously hour after hour so both hunter and dog relax a bit while traveling between known bird fields. The field trial competitor doesn't have this privilege for he is expected to show all the action that he is capable of during a comparatively short period of time. The instant the course runner softens his handler sends him on with a whistle blast or a sharp command whereupon "Jogmore Ripper" either goes back to hunting or takes off like a greyhound down the wagon road so that he can loaf again at the far end of the field. This trick will not fool the qualified field judge but it can create a problem when old "Edge Runner" stumbles on a fine covey and makes a spectacular point.

When birds are scarce and conditions are poor many good dogs will be birdless. Too often the judges are expected to place the dogs who find birds re-

gardless of their running or hunting style. I have known handlers to refuse to present their dogs for re-runs because, "He's already shot over." Perhaps the very good rule should be extended to read: "An All-Age dog must be steady to wing, to shot, and the bird ground."

When fox hound field trials are run the hounds are under judgment of as many as sixteen judges for three days—a total of at least twelve hours actual running time. The judges score every action that they observe on a point system. A hound may accumulate several hundred points for hunting, speed and drive but if at any time during the three long mornings a pair of judges decides that a hound for one minute is deliberately loafing, a line is penciled through his score on the bulletin board and "Scratched" written after his name.

Fox hunting and bird hunting are quite different type sports but one thing that the champion hound and winning bird dog should have in common is an overpowering compulsion to hunt game. He must not loaf on the job!

It would be unfortunate if a dog should win a field trial because he was tired of being cooped up and ready for a romp. If by chance a field champion has been made who worked this way I would rather own a three-legged dog who worked the dark spots to the best of his ability.

A most rewarding sight for the hunter is to look over a fine bird hunting countryside and to know the pattern that his dog will follow to find game. If a dog moves out of the hunter's line of sight and if by analyzing the ground before him and by confidence in his dog's ability to follow the birdiest pattern your hunting companion can point to the place where his dog will reappear to view you are hunting with a good hunter and a good bird dog!

## FALL TRIAL


The Fall Trial of the Michigan Saginaw Valley Brittany Club was held on new grounds this year off Grange Hall Road in the Holly Recreation Area about 17 miles south of Flint and not far north of our Detroit club and other out-of-state friends. October 1, 2, 1967 were the dates set for the trial and as you know, the opening date for grouse hunting near Gladwin, our previous trial area. Still, 74 dogs and their owners or handlers showed up for a good week-end of field trialing.

George Wilson and his co-chairman, Amos Greer, chose two pointer and setter men, and two Brittany men, to do the judging of the two day trial.

Saturday morning started the judging of 22 Open All-Age entries with Earl Chappell and Forrest Lavoy doing the honors. First place was awarded to Lee-way's Skyline Charlie, handled by Lee Holman, and owned by John W. Lee. Stories of his previous week-end's run turned out to be true when he again ran a beautiful race, had three staunch finds, one back, and really held when one bird flew back over his head. Charlie seems to be carrying on in the same fashion as his ancestors. Coming in second place was Dual Ch. Holley Haven Casey, owned by Henry Holleyoak, and handled by Lee Holman. Casey had cinched his Field Championship in the spring of '66 at Gladwin. He ran a good race, hunting well, had two finds which he handled excellently. Third place honors went to Worrellwind's Bucky Beaver, owned by Rufus Worrell, and handled by Lee Holman. Bucky ran well, had one find, one back and then a point on a bird the handler couldn't produce, but the judge had seen it. Fourth place was awarded to Gladwin Duke, owned and handled by Amos Greer, of Gladwin, Michigan. Duke ran a fair race and had one good find.

The Open Derby stake of 19 entries started in late afternoon Saturday under the judging of Ray Nickel and George Biffle. First place points went to Britnipper's Pokydot Gus, owned by Dr.

Donald Wilhemi, and handled by Lee Holman. Gus ran a fairly wide race, was consistent and steady in his search. He had one point but gave it a happy derby chase when it was flushed. Second place honors went to Holley Haven Heidi II, owned by B. L. Rix, Grosse Ile, Michigan, and handled by Lee Holman. Heidi started out a little slow but was really going strong when she finished. She had one point with which she was steady to the flush but gave her merry chase after the shot. Third place honors went to Stormmy of LaRue, owned by Fred Wood, and handled by Amos Greer. Stormmy ran a close race, but was consistently good in his hunting. He had

No birds were planted or released in this stake—only native birds or those released in previous stakes were available. The puppies are judged on potential ability—but any birdwork is given due consideration.

Amateur stakes are always the most fun. Twenty-one Amateur Gun Dog entries were judged by George Biffle and Raymond Nickel. First place points went to Hi Dolly Haven, owned by Gerald and James Cohen, and handled by Jim Cohen. This Western Michigan Brittany Club dog shows how far the membership of this newer club has come along in training and running of field trial dogs. Hi Dolly ran a very good forward race, hunting consistently, had one perfect find and was steady to wing and shot. Second place went to Ch. Joel's Copper Penny, owned by Ellyn Lee, Cleveland, Ohio, and handled by John G. Lee. Penny had a good race, was steady but not too wide and came in with one good find which she handled with perfect manners. Third place went to Gladwin Duke, owned and handled by Amos Greer, who placed him a second time this week-end. Duke had a close running pattern, was steady and hunted consistently well. He had one good find. Fourth place went to Fld. Ch. Lady's Hasty Nell, owned and handled by William Hughes. Nell ran a really good shooting dog race, had one good find and one stop to flush.

Statistics show that Lee Holman had 8 out of a possible 12 placements in our trial. We missed having Jane and John Thompson, Jack Plyler competing.

For you with top dogs who have been wondering where you stand for the past season . . . the results for the Fall of 1966. The top winning young dog, pictured below is **Tader**, owned by Bob Wagner and in the string of Lyle Johnson. A big string of 12 placements goes on this record, 9 of them in puppy stakes with both a puppy and derby first to frost the cake. Tader is from the first litter by Fld. Ch. Biffer Boy to appear on the circuit and has other winning littermates, one mentioned below.

Another standout is **Suzabob's Chickadee**, owned by Bob Young, and trained and run by B. Kline. Chick has a total of 8 places as well as bench points at the tender age of one year. She has a derby first while the remainder of her placements were in the puppy, including two firsts. Chick is a smallish orange and white bitch, by Fld. Ch. Shenango Valley Dingo out of Ch. Suzabob's Seminole Sadie.

Other winners are grouped with 4, 5 or 6 wins . . . those with 6 are as follows. Fredan Kennels has acquired **Beau Buford** from Jack Bradley during the season. Beau accounted for 3 firsts among his 6 derby placements . . . that is a record to make anyone proud. Beau is sired by Fredan's Rubob who was an

outstanding youngster. **Dingo's Cyclone**, owned and handled by Howard Crippen, lived up to his name by disintegrating all opposition in the puppy stake. He came up with 3 blue ribbons and also placed in the derby. **Holley Haven Heide II**, owned by B. Rix and in the Holman string also was right up there in the derby stakes. She showed consistency in her 6 places. And the last one in this group is **Why** . . . that is a question Vern Hager will have fun answering! But no matter what this pup's name, this littermate of Tader, is a real comer, with his 3 firsts and derby points as well as puppy ones.

To make things even five pups gained 5 places each. **Chartiers Valley Sam** finished a fine season with a 3rd place in the Futurity while **S'no Fun Mac** did the same with a 2nd Futurity placement. Sam and Mac kept the boys in the East Coast circuit on their toes, Sam in the Derby and Mac mostly in the Puppy. It is a healthy sign that our Futurity winners can also be top winners in other places, on other birds, and in different types of trials. **Morning Star Bob**, another Holman protegee, made his stand in the puppy stakes. Here is one that shows a good deal of promise for the future. **Ramble Creek Ramrod** climaxed his season of puppy placements with a fine first. He was piloted by his owner A. D. Nicholson. **Sneck de Klemanor** worked consistently for the Holmans to come up with 2 firsts. He must have made owner Noggle pleased as he is sired by his old Skipper.

A large group of youngsters took home 4 ribbons. **Cindy's Chico Diablo** went all the way to Oklahoma to prove her prowess on quail. She is owned by the Californians, Marge and Charlie Ayres. **Duke Rusty Dee Jay**, another Rusty de Morningside—Johnson product won two puppy firsts. **Freck O Dee** picked off two good sized derby stakes. **Happy George** swept the West Coast puppy stakes under the tutelage of Carl Percell. **Hatten's Lady Holly** was owner handled and picked off a placement in each of the

California trials. **Joshua de Lamont**, now owned by Dwight Williams, has the makings of a real fine dog. **Jocko's Poker Chip** had 3 firsts out of the 4 places with the last one the big one, the Futurity. **Melot's Cochise** did most of his winning in all breed stakes. And last may we brag on **Juchoir's Cover Boy**, owned by Bill Stein, with his two puppy firsts and a fine future in store.

In the older dogs last spring's second place dog moved way out ahead of the field. **Destry**, that just barely over derby age dog, was the winner of 12 placements. It isn't clear who should take the credit as he is equally in the winning column with trainer Johnson, or owner Pat Vulgamore's husband, Fred. Un-

doubtedly he will be one to watch with his 30 total placements at less than 3 years of age. Needless to say his championship has been completed.

In second place with 8 places is **Spicks on Mugho Hill**. Here is another case where credit is divided . . . between the two Gleasons, father and son. Some observers say son Gleason outhandles his father. Spicks is still knocking on the door for that last elusive first place to make his points total ten.

There is a two way tie for third place. **Lund's Trooper** and **Way Kan Jeff** tie with seven ribbons. With another season like this one Trooper will finish with a record of 100 placements in AKC trials. He now has totaled that if American Field Trials are also counted. Jeff managed half his placements in Brittany trials and half in other breed stakes. He also picked up a Dual Championship in Canada this season.

**A. J.'s Hilltop Pierre** came through with 6 places. This puts him almost to the 50 mark for his total. **Buddy Boy VII** got one of his 6 places in Brittany trials. He picked off several small stakes in all-breed trials.

Now for those who have 5 places . . . **Ch. Colorado's Yankee Timber** is still in there pitching. He almost made that last needed win for his Dual. **Handjem's Ruffhouse Toby** got an impressive string of seconds in his try for that same win, which would have given him his field title. **Helgramite Howie** now joins the rest of those Helgramite Duals as he made his last points at Southern New England. **Holley Haven Casey**, now a Dual, with a placement in the National Championship and winner of the ABC Dual Award makes the Holleyoaks grin wider. **Pike's Peak Rambler** made all the all-breed Colorado trials and took home the hardware each time, including the one held by the Brittanies. **Tigar's Jocko** went the entire length of the Coast setting a pace for all to follow. **Trooper's Little Frenchman** was right along on that trek too, a dog that makes the judges sit tall in the saddle.

And then there were four . . . **Ba-zooka's Brandy** did what everyone dreams of . . . went to Crab Orchard and at less than 3 years, won first to become a Field Champion of Record as well as the National Champion. **Cisco Kid** has been hitting the all-breed trials repeatedly with success. **Fld. Ch. Gary's Beau Kiki** hits this column for the seventh successive time, a record unequalled by any other liver dog. **Leeway's Skyline Charlie** has picked up the banner dropped by Ferdy and is waving it high for the John Lees. **Sue City Sue**, after time out to have pups, is back to win and to watch her pups win too. **The Circuit Contender** will be titled soon if he keeps on the way he is going. **Worrellwind's Bucky Beaver** keeps the gallery talking.

We note odd facts as we compile these lists each season. This time we noted a placement by Fld. Ch. **Rendezvous Excell** when he was just short of his 13th birthday. We also note the number of women handlers who are out with their husband's dogs . . . and in the win column too.

# Greater St. Louis

## FALL TRIAL

by Ray Trimble

The St. Louis Brittany Club held its 1966 fall trial on November 12 and 13, over the winding contiguous courses of the Busch Wildlife Area at Weldon Springs, Missouri. The courses, generally, were in good condition, with some heavier cover, occasionally. One item was present, without which a continuous course trial becomes a nightmare, and that commodity was native quail. The Open All-Age braces, with the exception of two, had ample opportunity to show on birds. The weather was typical Missouri fall weather and the trial moved on schedule, except for Sunday morning when a heavy fog picked just the Busch Area to settle over. Starting time was delayed a bit over an hour.

The Open All-Age got off to an early start Saturday morning, under the experienced and watchful eyes of Paul Bone and Dr. Max Holcomb. Way Kan Jeff, handled by Lyle Johnson, with a wide forward pattern and a dandy covey find, out front, along a creek edge, topped a field of 30 high caliber All-Age Britts. Jane De Carlo, owned and handled by Roy Quick, came awfully close to getting that most elusive last Open All-Age win needed to finish her championship. Her usual well applied ground race, with a covey find in the edge of the timber earned her a close second place. Her handler, Mr. Quick, a little excited after the find, attempted a "quick" mount from the right hand side of his horse, and quickly found himself over on the left hand side. Shorty, handled by Lyle Johnson, was third, with an acceptable All-Age race, which he topped off by being found on point in heavy cover, with a well located covey. Longtown, handled by Jim Holman, was 4th on the basis of finally pinning down a moving covey along a corn field edge. Both handler and judge had to dismount to cross a deep ditch in order to get to the dog and the subsequent action.

Your reporter would like to pass on an observation or two at this point. It was indeed a pleasure to observe All-Age dogs in action, under natural conditions,

as was the case at the Busch Wildlife Area. It seems to this scribe that there is something about continuous courses with native coveys that brings out the best in an All-Age dog. Both judges made a point of remarking that this was one of the best All-Age stakes for overall performance by All-Age dogs, that they had ever witnessed.

The Deby and Amateur stakes were run on Sunday with Charlie John and Ed Kuntz keeping a sharp eye on the Derbies, while Paul Bone and Dr. Holcomb assessed the performance of the Amateur All-Age.

Lyle Johnson's little dog Why that won the Puppy stake Saturday, came on to victory again by winning the Derby. Several wide running enthusiastic Derbies blew their chances for glory by failing to handle birds with acceptable manners. A couple of these youngsters were Tader handled by Johnson and Crab Orchard Buck handled by Trimble.

The Amateur All-Age suffered from lack of clearly defined All-Age bird work. Even a second series between Van Patten's Geronimo and Andy Luczkowski's Painted Desert failed to improve the situation. Placements for first and fourth were withheld.





Also thanks to our good friend and benefactor Link Raahauge who was so kind as to furnish us the grounds as well as the club house facilities.

This trial proved that more and better Brittanias will be in contention in the future.

## MORE ON *Hip Dysplasia*

The Orthopedic Foundation for Animals, Inc. (OFA) and Hip Dysplasia Control Registry welcomes inquiries regarding hip dysplasia and other orthopedic diseases which affect animals. The following questions are excerpted from letters received from dog owners and breeders.

1. QUESTION: The results of hip dysplasia examinations are said to be held confidential by the OFA. Will you explain this policy?

ANSWER: The results of an examination of a pelvic radiograph will be held confidential between the veterinary radiologists who serve as examiners for the OFA, the owner of the dog, and the veterinarian who took the radiograph. It is policy that the office of the OFA will not supply any information regarding the results of an examination unless the owner has given written permission. This holds true even with dogs certified as having normal hip joints. Those who inquire about a dog will be informed that before the files will be examined to see whether the dog is listed, there must be written permission from the owner of the dog authorizing the OFA to do so.

2. QUESTION: Please discuss the required minimum age of a dog for certification by the OFA.

ANSWER: The minimum age of a dog for radiographic diagnosis and certification by the OFA is one year. Severe hip dysplasia changes appear early and may be diagnosed radiographically at the age of ten to twelve weeks, but in the milder cases of hip dysplasia the changes appear later and the dog is usually six to twelve months of age before these are visible radiographically. Since in each such examination the future of the dog is at stake, it seems reasonable to defer examination until the dog is one year of age, at which time the hips are stabilized and a positive determination can be made.

3. QUESTION: In the selection of dogs free from hip dysplasia, pelvic muscle mass has been emphasized. How can the amount of pelvic muscle mass be judged?

ANSWER: First, it is recommended that breeders examine American Greyhounds (a large breed not affected with hip dysplasia) for comparison. This breed is well muscled, and an impression of the good pelvic musculature can be gained by feeling the muscles over the loin and rump and around the thighs. Second, the circumference of the thigh can be measured for comparison. In calculating the circumference of the thigh, the entire leg is measured with a tape measure as high as possible at the crotch. Allowance must be made for heavy hair coats and excessive fat. It has been estimated that a heavy hair coat may add as much as three inches to the circumference of the thigh. A good quantity of pelvic muscle mass appears to be the key factor in hip soundness, and it deserves attention when breeding and training stock are selected.

Information that we have collected indicates that the 50 pound dog should have a thigh circumference at the crotch of 15 inches.

4. QUESTION: In restraining a dog when a pelvic radiograph is taken, is it necessary to anesthetize the dog?

ANSWER: Even with tractable dogs, it is helpful to use some form of sedation. Anesthetics are not used as much now as formerly. The tranquilizing drugs have proved safe and satisfactory. Our experience is limited to Sparine (Wyeth Laboratories) and Innovar-Vet (McNeil Laboratories); both of these drugs have worked very well in our hip dysplasia work.

5. QUESTION: In our area there seems to be difficulty finding a veterinary hospital with x-ray equipment satisfactory for taking pelvic radiographs. What do you advise?

**ANSWER:** Most communities have at least one veterinary hospital where adequate equipment and good quality radiographs can be obtained. It is usually a matter of locating where such services are available.

It is suggested that if an officer of the local kennel club were to contact an officer of the local veterinary association a list of hospitals offering this service could be obtained without difficulty. The officers of the local veterinary association would be pleased to tell you who has the equipment and is ready to take the pelvic radiographs.

As in all disease control programs, good liaison between the kennel club members and veterinarians is necessary. Much would be accomplished if the officers of the kennel club invited the officers of the local veterinary association to a joint meeting to discuss the matter of service. Each group is dependent on the other. Why not get together and discuss the problems? Try it!

**6. QUESTION:** Is it necessary to put my



**X-ray of correct set of hips**


dog completely out when it has a pelvic radiograph taken?

**ANSWER:** Short-acting anesthetics have worked very well for taking pelvic radiographs. However, there are a number of new tranquilizers that are also safe and most satisfactory. Innovar (McNeil) has worked especially well for us.

**7. QUESTION:** What exactly is Hip Dysplasia?

**ANSWER:** In the photographs note where the round ball of the leg bone fits into the socket near the center of each picture. In the left-hand picture the socket is deep and round. It should be shaped like half an orange, not like half a lemon. In the picture on the right the sockets show plainly that there is wear, that the ball is loose in the socket and so will cause pain and further wear as it slips with each movement, even to the point of dislocation in some dogs. These sockets are flat and the ball does not fit into the socket tightly. This is hip dysplasia.

## SHOW vs. FIELD *Obedience*

by Dorothy MacDonald

### Conflicting or Compatible?

In my opinion there are very real conflicts and the sooner they are recognized the more quickly can they be harmonized to produce the Dual Champion U.D.T. Brittany.

### Field vs. Obedience.

The conflict here is not the oft quoted one of "sitting on points." It is a deeper one of basic principle. Simply stated it is—Initiative vs. Directed Action. Obedience with a capital O—meaning competitive obedience—is a finished, highly stylized performance. This, like the ballet of the dance world, is a thing of precision and beauty in its own right. The team work between owner and dog, the style and speed, and the polish all combine to create an exciting exhibition. However—the basic first step in learning this precision is for the dog to learn that he must not make a move unless and until directly commanded to do so. Anticipation is one of the many pitfalls of would be U. D. title holders.

An Obedience dog must be extremely intelligent in order to know and differentiate between the many commands. He must be an eager, willing worker in order to immediately execute each command. But he must not, at any time, initiate an action of his own. Obedience is team work with the owner directing and the dog executing.

Now to the Field. The dog should be obedient—yes—but with a small o. While he should come when called and not pull your arm off when on leash; this is second, very second, to his showing Initiative and Independence. Both with a capital I.

Turn your puppy loose when an experienced field trialer or professional trainer is with you. If you are like me and immediately start trying to direct your dog with whistle and arm signals; you will, in no uncertain terms, be told: "keep quiet—let the puppy alone—let him figure it out for himself—let him learn to gauge wind and scents, to seek likely objectives, to pattern his run and

to increase his range." Let him do this ALL ON HIS OWN.

The Brittany is willing to please and desirous of doing what you want him to. Consequently, if you start with a young puppy and teach him to look to you for direction and command, you are likely to have serious trouble trying then to instill Initiative and Independence. This is often demonstrated when an Obedience trained dog is placed with a professional field trainer. The dog will in almost all instances range wider and show more drive for his trainer than for his owner. He has not quite forgotten his early training that insisted he look to his owner for all commands.

What then is the answer? Am I simply saying that no Field Champion can at the same time have a U.D. degree? Obviously not. What I am saying is that in order to get top performance out of a dog in both areas one must be very careful of the timing used in training.

While it may be true that working breeds should start Obedience training at six months; no pointing breed should begin that young—that is if you wish a top field contender. Let your puppy do his grade school work in the field. Let him learn to think for himself, to use his nose and to develop as only experience will let him develop.

Then, when he is ready for field manners, he will also be ready to wear his choke collar and to learn the precise owner/dog cooperation necessary for top Obedience work. At this time he will be able to do this without losing the Independence and Initiative needed in the field.

### Obedience vs. Breed.

The conflict I see between Obedience and confirmation judging is not the usual one of "sit vs. stand." Obviously if a dog knows both commands it is merely up to the handler to give the right one. It should not be too difficult for a professional or amateur handler to remember to say "stand" when he stops gaiting and wishes to stack the dog.

The conflict I see is in the all important area of gaing. There is no question that a dog moving with drive, a dog pulling slightly on his leash, a dog one step ahead of his handler presents a better picture than a dog moving at heel. Let us also face the fact that a dog driving will show better and wider rear movement than a dog trotting at your side. It is not just a question of a loose leash. Many good judges insist on seeing a dog move on a loose leash. It is the dog's attitude. If he is concentrating on adapting his stride to yours in order to stay in the accepted heel position his gait will be distorted. It is also extremely hard for a handler to find and set the ideal pace for a particular dog when that dog is himself adjusting to the handler.

Again, the solution is one of timing. Let your puppy get used to the show leash and to moving freely with proper drive and animation. Give yourself, or your handler, time to learn the pace best suited to your dog. Then, and only then, let him wear his choke collar and learn to slow or hurry his step to suit yours when performing in the Obedience ring.

Field vs. Breed.

Have I finally run out of conflicts?

Not quite; although I find the area of conflict here is one of common sense or lack of it. It is an area often ignored by a too eager field trialer. All too many young puppies are allowed to exhaust themselves in an orgy of over eager hunting. Running when exhausted causes muscles not yet fully developed, to be pulled or strained. As the youngster matures this will often result in a bad shoulder fault or poor rear movement. The fault will erroneously be blamed on his breeding and will handicap him in the breed ring. Definitely a puppy must be allowed to run and hunt; but you should set the time limit and the gauge should not be his enthusiasm but your common sense. Field trial puppy stakes are deliberately set at almost half the length of other stakes. By all means make the practice sessions equally short. Then your puppy can go from field to the show ring and move with the faultless soundness that will be a tribute to his breeding and to you.

Show vs. Field vs. Obedience. Conflict? Yes. Compatible? Yes. The choice is yours. Use good timing and common sense and congratulations on your Dual Champion U.D.T. Brittany.

### LAZY HENS

Nebraska hunters are being encouraged to consider the future possibility of including a limited number of hens in the ringneck pheasant bag. A 9-year experiment, recently concluded, demonstrates that the removal of as many as one-fifth of the hen population in a given area has no measurable effect on total reproduction. The work, done in Clay County, showed that an average of 39 per cent of the females accounted for all the young. Even during the best years, only 54 per cent of the hens were productive.

Currently hens are a part of the legal bag in only five states. Those advocating liberalization point out that the hens of no other game-bird species enjoy such protection.

## THE *Dog* WITH A DELICATE AIR

We note the opening of Maine's skunk-hunting season. Through December 15, 1966, it will be lawful to hunt skunks at night with dogs.

Maine dogs must be highly regarded, to be blessed with four months of skunk hunting. This shows sympathy and understanding of the hound mind, for no human pleasure transcends the soaring bliss that a hound feels when he tears into a skunk.

To deprive a hound of skunks is to deny him a pungent badge of valor that proclaims to all the downwind world that here runs a dog in the full pride of houndhood. 




