

THE CASE FOR THE CLASSIC

Gentlemen of the Jury:

You are charged with the duty of finding the very best Brittanies in the country to be used as foundation stock for improvement of the broad

for improvement of the breed.

We will show beyond any reasonable doubt that the ABC Prairie Chicken Classic is one of the very best places in America to accomplish this. Two experts, highly skilled and knowledgable arbiters of canine performance will examine facts and take testimony for this very purpose on the famed 10,000 acre Buena Vista Prairie Chicken Management Area near Stevens Point and Wisconsin Rapids in Central Wisconsin. We submit that this area is nearly ideal for the purpose of this kind of proceedings.

At this time we would like to place in evidence a map of the Area which is marked exhibit "A." Please let the record show that the areas so marked show the lands which comprise the Prairie Chicken Management Area. We direct your attention to the fact that this is flat grassland with some woods border but mostly very lightly interspersed with scattered small individual trees or shrubs and some feed plantings of oats, buckwheat or corn.

We would like to point out that under these conditions a dog can be seen for

great distances.

It is also a fact that the Prairie Chicken population is a matter of record available to any interested citizen from the Department of Natural Resources, and further, that this information will show an increase in the number of birds present on the area at mating time this year.

It is also a matter of public record that weather conditions in Wisconsin this year have been the most favorable for the birds in many, many years.

We will show that these grounds are a real test for a bird dog; the very spaciousness of the area being an invitation to a dog to run; however, there are so many distant inviting places for him to go that if he does not choose his objectives wisely he is going to find himself out of gas with still a long ways

We are certain that you are aware that loud and sometimes eloquent pleas will at times be made by some of the handlers on behalf of their canine charges. We can assure you, gentlemen, that this will not enhance the chances of the competitors; indeed there is an excellent chance the birds will take offense at such unseemly behavior and depart hastily and indignantly without granting the offender an opportunity to apologize.

Should this occur it could completely spoil a dog's chance to exhibit the sterling qualities a good Prairie Chicken Dog should possess, to-wit: That he point staunchly from a respectable distance, the distance being a matter the dog is capable of determining by himself, but being such as not to put the birds to flight but withall indicating their lo-

cation to the handler.

In summary the demands of the grounds and game are as follows: The dog must have stamina and heart to search the large expanse of country, any of which may hold his quarry. He must have a superb nose so that he may take his country out in goodly sized chunks, still detecting the presence of birds. He must have the intelligence so that he will cover the ground in a manner requiring the least physical effort on his part so that he may conserve his energy for the long grind which he faces. Above all he must have the ability to properly handle truly wild birds. Usually this requires skill, knowledge and finess on the part of the dog.

Finally the dog must be fully trained. He should handle with minimum of noise, yet run ambitiously without vocal urging. He should show independence in selecting his objectives but should respond to his handler's directions will-

ingly.

Gentlemen, this is what is known as class. This is what the judiciary will be seeking. This is the type of dog you should be glorifying.

We implore you to give due consideration to devising a means of giving proper recognition to dogs which are winners in stakes where the birds on the courses are 100% wild, without the slightest possibility that they or their immediate forebears have been reared in captivity; where dogs run for a full hour or more on ground that has not that day been disturbed by horse tracks or human tracks; where there are no paths to follow except the running pattern that belongs exclusively to the dog. The winner in such an event is a superior dog and should be recognized as such, particularly with respect to qualification for Championship Stakes.

Gentlemen, we rest our case and respectfully request an adjournment until 7:30 a.m. Central Daylight Time, September 13th, at Buena Vista, at which time and place this hearing will be resumed and an adjudication of the issues will be made.

Trial Talk

The spring season brought forth 22 youngsters and 30 adult dogs who took home five more ribbons. A new and more rapid system of compiling the spring winners was attempted in the compilation of these records. Any errors or omissions should be called to the writer's attention.

The top youngster for the season was Brandy's Pacolet San, owned by John Madia of Wyoming and Warren Butler of California. Warren was the dog's handler and amassed an even dozen placements with the pup, scoring in both puppy and derby competition in trials from the shores of the blue Pacific east to Oklahoma. San was bred by Bob Wooldrik — from his Brandy Anne — Cheyenne Sam litter.

Following on San's heels and in direct competition with him was **Dualite** Mike et Pierre with nine places. This dog is owned by Karen and Bob Oppie who, previously, had been avid show fans. They hit the jackpot in their first serious attempt at field competition and have a possible dual on their hands. Ron Neumann is responsible for their dog's development.

There were three dogs who placed eight times. The top east coast winner was Sandy Valley Duke's Daisy, owned by Bill and Nancy Ullery. Daisy is the first big winner to be sired by Tondee's Sandy Valley Duke. She placed a couple of times in the derby, though still of puppy age. Hello Dolly Miss Kaer will be remembered for her Futurity placement last fall. She appeared under a new banner this spring as Les May acquired her during the season. Les also owns Cheyenne Sam's Repeat, another eight time winner. In addition his Perry's Rustic Prince placed in seven stakes. His three derbies cornered the market with 13 firsts among their 23 placements. How 'bout that!

The magic number of seven produced just that number of winners. In addition to Prince we find Chieftain's Little Dingo, owned by Ike Vigil, who began the season in the puppy stake and finished up placing consistently in the derby. Dave-O Neo Valley Digger did his

bit all in the derby. Owned by Margie Davis he was handled by her husband, Evert. (the dog's breeder) who always puts down a good one. Jill the Pill, owned and handled by Jerry Watkins, did her bit from down Texas way, sneaking in one derby ribbon among her consistent puppy places. Jill is a Bazooka's Brandy pup. Timber's Marquis de Colorado picked up both his puppy and derby points for Luke Ruiz, Marquis is royally bred-from Colorado Yankee Timber and Jumping Gypsy. Sam's Chip Britt J. P. Schroeder (what a handle that is!) is the latest winner of John and Peg Sawyer of Pennsylvania. A son of Chartier's Valley Sam, the dog was handled in all his appearances by Gerry Cohen. Solo's Pepperdust, a nice liver and white, completed his derby stint with a lifetime record of 18 places. He is owned by Mrs. Bill Hoffman and has been campaigned in the east.

To win six places in one season is a record of which any owner may be proud. Ricky's Smiling Ranger, owned and handled by the genial Wilson Miars, accomplished that feat. Bear Wallow Bobbie did the same. Bobby, Dewey Mullin's latest big winner, is from his successful mating to Kay Cee Bandit that has produced several winners. Wyotana Buzzer, limited by his March birthdate, still managed to place six times. He's the Futurity winner with Madia-Butler ownership. Sequan; des Collines proved that a Brit from a show strain can hold its own with the best field dogs. Gringo's Butterscotch Taffy, owned and handled by Jim Woltering, is the final six time winner. He made his record in both puppy and derby.

Jim Fry opened the eyes of his fellow competitors with Rockbrook's Andy O'Dee. Andy had five places as did the remainder of the youngsters mentioned here. Winterton's Jocko, owned by Ray Swenson and in the Holman string, rounded out a nice derby season. We'll look for more of this one. The latest of the Suzabob's Hey You Willie. He is owned by the Kline-Young combo. Harmony Lane Sissie sports an interesting com-

bination of bench and field lines with Augustus of Rivers as her sire. She performed well under the magic touch of John Ivester, Tate's Wee Lad O'Bonny Doon, another in the string of that avid amateur Warren Butler, shows a great deal of promise for the future. Durango de Madison, Walt Chapman's white hope, had a good season. He's a Gringo de Britt pup.

The top winning adult is making quite a record for herself. In a little over 21/2 years of campaigning Suzabob's Frisco Frannie has won 37 places, 11 of them this past season. Frannie, by Tigar's Jocko out of a Leeway bitch, is handled by her owner, Gerald Supplee, member of the new Del Val club. Her spring record was a quality one as she had five firsts.

In second place is another female, Christy's Featherduster, with a lifetime record of 29 places at under three years of age. Dusty won nine places this season under the handling of Lyle Johnson. She is owned by her breeder, Butch Gerlach.

In third place, believe it or not, is ANOTHER bitch, Hi Dolly Haven. Dolly began the season with a Quail Classic placement, took eight ribbons and completed her field title.

These top three gals should point up a fact to those who request special privilege for bitches that, if a bitch has the quality, she can make just as good a record as a male in these days of lengthy trial seasons.

Sharing third place honors with Dolly is the top western contender, Black Butte's Ricochet Trooper, Lund's youngest field winner. Ricky is building up a nice lifetime record. Timberlane's Tex, owned by Ed Randall, had two firsts among his eight places but, because he had no puppy or derby record, he still reaches for his title.

The following won seven places. Noio's Suzi, the Ganje's new field champion, completed her title with three firsts in Open Gun Dog stakes. Though the first two wins were in large stakes at Brittany trials neither qualified as her major win for the stakes were open to other breeds. Kipo's Tammy Mike was Warren Butler's weapon in adult competition. His places were in both open and amateur competition. Charlie Boy II, under the handling of owner Harold

Brown, made them sit up and take notice the length and breadth of the Midwest circuit. He came within a gnat's eye of completing his title. Tondee's Sandy Valley Duke began the season with a string of five firsts and ended it with a win in the last trial of the season. Would you believe he has 24 firsts among his 35 places? Hi-Spirit Ladie, Darrell Gaynor's powerhouse, has regained his confidence after his serious tumble last fall and is right up there among the best. Way Kan Fritts is back in the groove and is setting a nice record for his new owner, Ronnie Stevenson, with Lyle Johnson the handler.

Seven dogs won six ribbons apiece. Evergray's Tic Toc Terry hit his stride this season and created favorable comment as he picked up points in two trials. He's a comer. Conte de Fere, or Athos as his proud owner, Fred Bremner prefers to call him, picked up some more points along his way and should finish without any problem. LeCar's White Smoke has had a substantial number of places during each of the past seasons and is close to the 50 mark in his lifetime record. He's a quality dog. Jacque of Connie won three firsts in his six placements. He is well spoken of in the Brittany world. Suzabob's Seminole Sadie, Bob Young's potential dual, is in there pitching trying for that final Open win for her field title. Briarpatch Doctor Zachery, a first-year all-age, did the job right for Jack Cash. He has six ribbons to prove it. Augustus of Rivers continues to run up his string of firsts, three more this spring plus a Quail Classic placement.

Finally, these dogs have five placements each. Rebel Roi des Champs won two firsts as did Tyone de Malibeau. Rhoad's Dusty and Air Cargo de Britt completed field championships while Coveymoor's Bomarc made his dual. Dusty of Lakeview's placements were all in the Open. S'No Fun Mack had a Pheasant Classic placement. Fluke de Britt's places were in both derby and adult competition. Suzabob's Hedgerow Happy added his five to an already substantial record as did Killey. Scipio Spinks is still winning-for his fourth owner. Char-Lee O'Dee won just five as he was laid up for the major portion of

this season.

* THE CHEWING BRITTANY *

There are two things the Brittany does with a vengeance, dig monstrously big holes and chew anything and everything. Now, not all Brittanies are chewers but a good many of the breed are.

Tales have been told of the Brittany who ate all the cloth from an umbrella, of one who ate a partial plate, of one who chewed a hole in a room sized rug, of one who ate a steering wheel (well part of it anyway), of one who ate some of the woodwork in the kitchen, etc., etc.

Let's look into the reasons why a dog chews. One of the main reasons is boredom. If the dog has nothing exciting to occupy his time, especially the young dog, he may chew just for lack of any-

thing else to do.

It's easy to break this dog of the habit. Just keep him busy. You might try running him more. You can give him something of his own that he is allowed to chew and punish him if he bites into anything else. It isn't recommended that you give him an old shoe because he may not be able to differentiate between a discarded shoe and a new one. Many companies put out rawhide chew toys made especially to give the dog something tough to work on. These are excellent though some dogs consume them in almost no time at all. If your dog is one of that type you will have to look around for something tougher for a chew toy. Whatever you do settle on should be kept at hand so that the minute the dog starts chewing something that's forbidden scold him and give him the chew toy, playing with him with the toy for a moment and praising him when he chews on it.

Most puppies will chew a considerable amount when they are teething, roughly between four and six months of age. Constant vigilance is necessary during this period but you can look forward to the fact that he will probably quit the habit when his permanent teeth

come in.

The most difficult dog to cope with is the very intelligent one who resents being left alone. Some Britts will have impeccable manners in all respects when there is someone in the house with them. But leave them alone while you go to the store and you may return to find the contents of the wastebasket strewn all over the place and the things in it torn and chewed. It's your dog's way of saying that he wanted to go and did not want to have to stay home alone. The best trained dog may steal objects from tables and counters if left alone, partially devour them, and be sitting right beside them defiantly when you return. That's the kind that it is impossible to break in most cases. You can try driving the car down the street, sneaking back quietly and trying to catch him in the act. It hardly seems worth the effort and time involved. The dog's intense hearing will make it very difficult to sneak up on him quietly enough. The punishment may have to be delivered innumerable times.

There are two simple solutions to this problem. The first is to take the dog everywhere with you. (You may find him angry at being left in the car and working on its innards with his teeth!) The second solution may cost you a bit but it is about the most sure way of keeping the dog from chewing the house up, that is to buy a metal crate and shut him in it when you leave the house. The cost may floor you as a good metal crate, Brittany size, will run you around \$40 or \$50. But when you consider the value of the things that the dog may destroy you will find it the most economical buy you ever made.

The kennel dog may be a great chewer. Here, again, it will be mostly from boredom. To keep your kennel looking new you might consider facing all the corners and edges with metal stripping. The galvanized material used as edging for metal roofs can be easily bent to protect the edges of the dog's bed, or the corners of his door. If he chews the walls you might consider sheathing the wooden walls with asbestos board. It has the disadvantage of being quite brittle and must have a very solid backing but dogs find it very unpalatable. The

pressboards, like Masonite, will withstand the onslaughts of the ordinary chewer when new but as it absorbs moisture it takes on almost the texture of cardboard. It won't stave off the persistent chewer, even when it is new.

One must be careful in the choice of paint for the kennel of the chewing dog. Lead based paints can poison a dog. Linseed oil is recommended as a finish for a kennel because it helps with flea and tick control. However, dogs love its taste and it may cause a dog who has never chewed his kennel house to go to work devouring all that nice tasting oil.

Noxious tasting liquids may be used to paint the areas that a dog chews but a careful selection must be made. The choice must be something that tastes terrible but won't hurt the dog if he consumes large amounts of it. Pepper, in some medium that will hold it on the walls, might work. Not only must you consider what will hurt the dog if he eats too much of it but you have to make a choice of something that won't burn or sting the dog's skin. It's not really a great solution!

OBITUARIES

Alvin Chasteen, member of the Missouri Club almost since its inception, was killed in a one-car auto accident recently. Al held several offices in the club and also did some judging. He will be remembered by those who were around in the early fifties as the owner of Dutchman de Richelieu. Al will be much missed by his friends in the Missouri and Midwest Clubs. Our sympathies go out to his widow, Virginia.

Marvin Nelson, long-time member of the ABC, died recently. He was a former Treasurer of the organization and had placed his famous "Towsey's Bub" several times in National competition. Marv was an avid hunter and a real Brittany booster. He owned several good dogs at the time of his death. He was always willing to work for his local club and the Southern Kansas Club will sorely miss him.

HEARTWORMS

Within the past year, there has been a great deal of confusing information concerning heartworms passed on to the dog owning public. It is in the hope of answering some of the questions which have arisen that I am writing this.

Heartworms, an infestation with Dirofilaria immitis, is a common infection in the South, but has only become apparent in the northern states in the last decade. The infective larval stage of this disease is transmitted by the bite of all types of mosquitoes. The larva are accumulated in the mosquitoes' saliva and are deposited on or just in the skin during the bite. During the next 12-24 hours they migrate through the subcutaneous tissue to the small blood vessels under the skin. Then they travel via the blood stream to the heart, reaching the right side of the heart in 60-90 days after the bite. Once in the heart, they grow and develop, over a period of 6-9 months, to mature worms. While in the heart, they start producing non-infective microfilaria that circulates in the systemic blood vessels. These microfilaria are picked up by mosquitoes through biting the infected animal, and are passed, in turn, to a new host animal through the subsequent bites of the mosquito carrier. Hence, the life cycle, as described above, begins anew.

During the period of worm development in the heart, your dog will show little or no signs of disease. It is only the enlarging adult worms which slowly cause the lung damage which leads to the symptoms of the disease. These symptoms include deep cough, spitting up blood, and easy tiring on exercise. These signs usually occur 12-24 months after the original infecting mosquito bite and once they develop, the disease is often fatal. Now, the important point is that this infection is most easily treated during its early stages before your dog develops the previously described clinical signs of lung damage. If the clinical signs do appear, the infection becomes extremely difficult to treat successfully.

First and foremost, appreciate that if

you control or eliminate mosquito exposure to your dog, you will greatly decrease or prevent his risk of exposure. Many methods of control are available, including applying insect repellents to your dog's coat, regular fogging of nearby bushes, screening of outdoor kennel areas, and—especially for house pets—keeping your dog inside from dusk until dawn.

Secondly, there is a relatively easy blood test that can be run by your veterinarian which will show the circulating non-infective microfilaria before the clinical signs develop. This test is important in that it must be run before any medication can be given. This test is recommended every 6 months, preferably at the beginning and end of the mosquito season in the northern states. If your dog's blood test is negative, there are three drugs which can be used on a preventative treatment basis:

Diethylcarbamazine (Brand names — Caricide, Dirocide, Styridcaricide). This drug is given daily during the entire mosquito season, plus a minimum of 30 days after. The drug will kill only the migrating larva before they enter the blood stream; however, missing 1 dose may lead to infection.

Dizan. Dizan is to be given daily for 1 week at regular intervals. This drug will kill the circulating microfilaria but not the adult worms in the heart.

Arsenical injections. These injections are given twice a year to kill the young adult worms before they have caused damage to the lung vascular bed.

In conclusion, to prevent this serious infection which can endanger your dog's life, try to control the mosquito population in your dog's environment, have his blood checked at your veterinarian's recommendation, and when there is uncontrollable mosquito exposure, especially in the case of hunting breeds, consider pursuing one of the preventative drug treatments.

1972 NATIONALS

It's getting near that time of year again, when the Brittany world is looking forward to the events of great importance in November, the National trials and shows.

All those who have written asking about the trials will find their questions answered below.

GENERAL INFORMATION

The Futurity, which begins Monday, November 6th, will be followed by the Amateur Championship at the West Kentucky Wildlife Area near Paducah, Kentucky. Most people will be staying at the Holiday Inn or at the Diplomat Motel, both located on the side of Paducah nearest the trial grounds, on Rt. 45 (NOT Business Route 45). It is suggested that you make your motel reservations now. Most dinners and evening events are scheduled for either the Holiday or Diplomat which are on opposite sides of a shopping center. Potter's Motel is no more. There are other fine motels on the other side of town.

In case you have forgotten let us remind you that the first Tuesday (the second day of the Futurity) is election day. You should apply for your absentee ballot if you wish to vote. No events are scheduled for that evening in order that trialers may watch the elections results.

Maps and general information may be obtained by contacting the ABC secretary at the Holiday Inn on Sunday morning from 9 to 12. If you wish to see the trial grounds prior to that take U.S. 45 (not Business 45) north from Paducah. At the light 9 of a mile beyond the Diplomat you will turn left on Route 305. Go about 5 miles to the fork in the road where you will take the right on Route 358. From this point it is 6.3 miles to the clubhouse. When Route 358 gets to Grahamville it turns sharp right and a quick sharp left on Lodge Road. Stay on it. You will next pass the Chief Paduke Club on the right and go under a powerline. Watch for the clubhouse on the left with the kennels just before you reach it. On the

right are the stables and a brick house. Don't pass this house. You will see the sign on the left designating that this is the West Kentucky Wildlife Area. Either Mr. or Mrs. Boss (they live in the brick house) can give you maps and directions to find the areas that are open for training.

Horse reservations may be made by contacting J. D. Boss, Kevil, Kentucky. Horse stalls and also kennels are available for \$1 per stall or kennel per day. There is a limit of 4 dogs per kennel. Those with house trailers and campers may park on the grounds near the stables for the duration of the trial.

If you wish to know in which brace you are drawn please contact one of the club officials. Remember that NO official has the authority to tell you at what time you will run. They can only give you your brace number. This is because, in a trial of this size and importance, it is quite possible that there will be many dogs picked up early, especially if several dogs have outstanding performances in the early braces. If you want to be sure of a chance to put your dog down, arrive early and be available. It is the owner or handler's responsibility to have the dog on the line when it is called. Don't take anyone's word for the time you will run (unless it's the very first brace of the trial!) Be sure you are there to get your chance. Those new to the grounds should stick close to either the car or horse gallery for it is hard to locate the running through the many dirt roads that crisscross the grounds.

FUTURITY (BENCH & FIELD)

The 1972 Futurity will be under the direction of Larry Wallace. Aiding him in the running of the trial will be a committee composed of Doug Croxton, Tim Poling, Dewey Mullins, Bob Heinel, Dan Buster and Ronnie Stevenson.

A list of all entries received with their pertinent information will be found on Pages 54 thru 61 of this magazine. Conditional entries (usually so designated because they lack a registration number) must be completed before a dog is eligible to run or to be shown. All entries have been acknowledged. If your entry is not listed you should contact Nicky Bissell, Sherwood, Ore. 97140 AT ONCE.

All those who own eligible Futurity dogs will receive entry torms for the Futurity, for the Specialty Show and for the Amateur Championship, Futurity entries must be received by the deadline, November 3. These entries are to be mailed to David Kenney, 5 Hillcrest, Carbondale, Il. 62901. The entry fee is \$10 for the Field and \$5 for the Bench. Do NOT send entries to the ABC office in Sherwood. If you wish to check on your entry please call the ABC secretary at the Holiday Inn in Paducah on Sunday morning from the hours of 9 to 12. Do not call Dave Kenney because he is only acting as a postal point for the mail and will not be processing entries.

The exact amount of the purse will be posted on the bulletin board in the club house. It can be expected that it will equal last year's figures when the first place field dog won \$1100 for his owner down to the fourth that paid \$400 as the owner's share. The bench purse will be approximately \$650 for the owner of Best Dog in Futurity down to an \$80 purse to the owners of the two who receive third money. The breeders of the winning dogs will receive one-half the above amounts.

The drawing for the Field Futurity will be held at the Clubhouse on the grounds on Sunday afternoon, November 5th, at 4 o'clock. The stake will begin the following morning at 7:30. The scheduled judges, both from Kentucky, are Ferrill Miller of Murray, and Dr. H. A. Gray of Bowling Green. Miller will be remembered by those who attended the 1972 Quail Classic in January for his astute decisions there. Dr. Gray judged one of the very early ABC Championships in the forties.

The Futurity is run under ABC jurisdiction and is not an AKC trial. The complete rules will be found on the veverse side of the entry forms. It is hoped, because this is the inaugural event this year, that birds will be more plentiful than when the stake was the last one on the program. The entry is anticipated to be around 100 dogs. All

those who have bitches in heat should notify the secretary before the drawing. They will be placed at the end of the stake

The Futurity Show will be held at the National Guard Armory beginning promptly at 9 on the morning of Friday, November 10th. You will find your dog's show number listed in the second column of numbers in the listing in this magazine. Dogs will be shown first and classes are divided into three separate groups by birth date, Jan.-Feb.-Mar., Apr.-May-June and July-Aug.

Judging this year's Futurity Show will be the well-known breeder, Robert Young of Glen Mills, Pa. Mr. Young breeds the Suzabob dogs which are noted for their winning both field and bench. As an experienced breeder and participant in shows, both as an exhibitor and as a judge, Mr. Young is aware of the dual standards and requirements.

SPECIALTY SHOW

The Specialty Show will be held on Friday, November 10th at the National Guard Armory with judging scheduled to begin at 1 o'clock. The judge, an honorary member of the American Brittany Club, is Maxwell Riddle of Ravenna, Ohio.

Several innovation_s are planned for this year's show. Among them are a Parade of Champions and classes for Stud Dog (with 2 of this get) and Brood Bitch (with 2 of his offspring).

The winter specialty is really the "Dual" show with many of the field participants entered mainly to try for points for the Dual Award. May we strongly stress that dogs who want points towards this award will stand a much better chance if they are entered in any class but the Open. The Open class usually has 15 or more dogs entered in it and so many dogs go unplaced. The other classes, Novice, American-Bred and Bred-By-Exhibitor attract a light entry and this presents a better opportunity for the field dog to get his dual points.

To win points towards the dual award a dog must place in the ribbons in one of the regular classes of the show, defeating at least one dog in the process. So, if the dog is entered in one of above classes with an entry of 5 and places anywhere in the ribbons he's eligible for the Dual Award. In addition the dog must receive points in the Open or

Amateur Championships.

The Parade of Champions, a non-competitive class, is held after the Best of Breed competition. Dogs will circle the ring individually while a short resume of their record will be read. Any bench champion entered in this class automatically receives 3 points towards the Dual Award, just exactly the same as for an entry in Best of Breed competition. He wins 3 points for one class or the other, not both.

The class was introduced so that those who owned bench champions that were in field condition, or that were getting beyond their prime for the show ring would not have to compete with the younger dogs. Instead of standing around the ring for a lengthy period in competition in the large Best of Breed Class (usually 20 or more entries) knowing there is no chance of defeating the younger dogs in their prime and in top show condition the dog may instead gait proudly around the ring once while spectators are informed of his major claims to fame.

The show chairman is Ray Cox of Tucson, Arizona who will be aided by a committee composed of Dorothy Macdonald, Dan Buster, Ellyn Lee, Wayne Fessenden, Jan Hoover and Eva Lewis. Entries close with the show secretary, Nicky Bissell, at the ABC office on October 24th at 8 p.m. Entry forms will be sent to all those who have Futurity entries, to the owners of dogs that qualified in the spring for the National Ametur Championship, and to those who entered last year's show. All others must request entries.

NATIONAL AMATEUR CHAMPIONSHIP

The Amateur will begin on Saturday, November 11th. A list of dogs that qualified in 1971 and in the spring of 1972 will be found on Page 19 in this magazine. Other dogs may qualify in the upcoming fall trials by winning first or second in any Amateur Stake in an AKC trial held by a regular Brittany Club. All Field Champions automatically qualify.

James Cohen is stakes manager for this stake and will be assisted by a committee which consists of La Reine Pittman (field trial secretary), Chuck Pecoy, Howard Tutton, David Kenney and Thomas Tiynan.

Entry blanks will be sent to all who have Futurities, to all who entered last year's Specialty Show and to all who entered last year's Amateur Championship and to the owners of the non-champions that are listed on Page 19 as having qualified. If you do not fall into any of these categories you should request entry forms from the ABC office or from La Reine Pittman.

Entries close November 1, 1972 with the field trial secretary, La Reine Pittman, 2515 Oakley, Kansas City, Mo. Those who qualify the last week-end, October 28-29 may phone their entries to Mrs. Pittman at 816-241-4768. Completed forms for these phone entries must be in the field trial secretary's hands with fee by November 4th or the entry will be cancelled. Dogs winning at trials scheduled after the closing date for entries will be eligible for the 1973 Nationals, not for those in 1972.

ZENAIDURA MACROURA

Known by a variety of names, including the Carolina dove, turtle dove, wild dove and wild pigeon, Zenaidura Macroura derives its most common name from its pleasant plaintive call—the cry of the mourning dove.

The mourning dove is distinctive among all game birds of North America in that it breeds in every state except Alaska and Hawaii and in every Canadian province. There are three subspecies: Z.m. carolinensis (Eastern United States and Canada); Z.m. marginella (Western United States, Canada and Mexico); Z.m. macroura (believed to be non-migratory and restricted to the Caribbean islands).

The male dove, topped with ashbrown feathers tinged with green, has a pinkish beige to its underparts. Its tail, blue-gray and spotted with white, has black running along the sides. A distinctive black spot adorns the side of the head, and the neck feathers are iridescent. The small and slender bill curves slightly downward. The female has a shorter tail and lacks the iridescence of the male. Adult birds average about 12 inches and weigh approximately 4 ounces.

The mourning dove builds its nest in a variety of places, usually seven or eight feet from the ground. (Some nests have been found $a_{\rm S}$ high as even 20 feet). A clutch generally consists of two eggs and hatching occurs in about two weeks. Both the male and female contribute to incubation, with the male taking his turn from approximately 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Maturity is reached in about six months.

The diet of the mourning dove consists of the strange combination of wheat, oats, rye, barley, weeds and insects, usually grasshoppers and worms.

Early settlers to the North American continent found the species in great abundance, but by the beginning of the 20th century, the population had declined. The National Audubon Society, however, has revealed that evidence indicates the mourning dove is not endangered but is, in fact, doing very well in all parts of its range. In at least 25 southern and western states where the species is numerous, the mourning dove is hunted as game in carefully controlled shooting schedules.

PERDIX PERDIX

Perhaps the ornithologists were running out of names when Perdix Perdix was christened. Why else would they have given him the same name twice? uniess, of course, as some of his most avid boosters would like to believe, it was done to emphasize the fact that he's twice as good as the run-of-the-mill game bird. Few sportsmen who have successfully hunted Perdix Perdix, or Hungarian partridge as he is better known, would argue the latter contention. For the Hun is a fast-flying target on the wing, sporty enough to test the mettle of any expert scatter gunner, and on the table, a succulent treat able to excite the taste buds of any gourmet.

Originally, the Hun, or more properly the European gray partridge, was introduced to our shores just prior to the turn of the century. After a number of unsuccessful plantings were made. this worthy immigrant finally got a firm foothold in the northwestern states and in several Canadian provinces. Since most of the plantings that took hold were birds imported from Hungary, the name Hungarian partridge, or simply Hun, naturally evolved. Gregarious throughout most of the year, Huns congregate and travel in coveys. Grains such as wheat, oat and millet make up the chief staples of the bird's diet, though at peak periods of insect activity. locusts, potato bugs, grasshoppers and other common varieties are readily gobbled up.

During the nesting season, which is in late spring, and through the incubation and brooding periods, both cock and hen share the business of raising the family. Mature Huns run about 12 to 14 inches in length, weigh between 12 and 13 ounces and are predominantly gray in color. Their wings are of a brownish hue, however, and the hunter first shooting Huns is often mystified to find that what appeared to be a russet-colored target on the wing turns out to be a gray bird on the ground.

Most Hun shooting is open country shooting, for the Hun's preferred habitat is the cultivated grain field. A close-bored 12-gauge shotgun, No. 6 shot and a fast, wide-ranging pointing dog are essential for consistently putting Perdix Perdix in the hunter's game pocket.

THE PRESIDENT SPEAKS

In March we really put some miles on in travelling around the country. Although Ella and I met on the West Coast and lived there for awhile I hadn't been back in 18 years. Last fall we started planning on a trip this spring to attend a couple of field trials. Northern California and Oregon Clubs extended me an invitation to judge their trials on consecutive week-ends which helped on expenses while we were out there. A business meeting developed in San Francisco and I made a stop off in Denver on business on my way home so travel expenses were reduced. How lucky can one get.

Looking at bird dogs is one of the most enjoyable things I know of and judging offers the best seat in the house. It is always more of a pleasure to judge dogs with whom you are unfamiliar so I looked forward to the Northern California and Oregon assignments and was not disappointed. And one couldn't ask for two more diverse types of grounds than Grizzly Island and Camp Adair. As a result we saw completely different types of performances on successive week-ends by many dogs although there were some that did fine

jebs both times. I was asked while there, and have been asked back this way since, how I thought the West Coast dogs compared with the eastern dogs. I would have to say very favorably. In general I feel, based on what I saw, that the West Coast dogs are better broke than Midwest, Central and East Central dogs particularly and somewhat more so, perhaps, than the East Coast dogs. West Coast derbies are definitely stauncher on point than those over the rest of the country. There was seldom any question of a derby pointing acceptably-in most cases handlers were able to flush in front of the dog. That is more the exception than the rule east of the Rockies, I believe. However, generally speaking, the West Coast dogs don't handle cover as well as the Midwest, Central and East Central dogs due to lack of opportunity. This shows when they come east for the Nationals, Of course, I think the staunchness of the West Coast derbies shows in Futurities. Look at the number of Futurity placements including firsts that have gone to West Coast futurities in the past seven or eight years. It is more than proportional to the entries. As far as all-age dogs handling cover goes I would expect to see the dogs from elsewhere have some problems on the West Coast until they adapted and I saw many dogs on the West Coast that would handle the cover east of the Rokies in fine style after having a chance to adapt to it.

After returning home we attended the Pennsylvania and Ohio regional trials and following the Ohio trial wended our way to Green River, Ill., via Dewey Mullins' grounds in Kentucky to pick up our horses, to the Pheasant Classic. These are fine trial grounds and a lot of people put in much hard work for the Classic only to see it almost negated by some unseasonably heavy snow. The Classic came off in good shape nevertheless with a worthy winner in Brandy's Bullet. Again we met many new friends from this area as well as renewing acquaintances with some of the old timers. It was good to see Hazel Bone and the Lafleurs again.

While we were in Oregon Nicky told me Fred White had a complete bound set of past issues of the American Brittany Magazine that belonged to the club. Since Fred is located less than an hour from the Classic headquarters I called him and he graciously consented to turn them over to me. I now have them and I must say that it is a most humbling experience to read through the early editions and see the names of so many people very actively involved today who were the backbone of the club in its early days. The magazines go back to the first issue published in October 1942 when it was called "The Brittany Field and Bench." There is a break in continuity in the set starting in 1959 but Jack and Ruth Secor told me they have most of their back issues and will be pleased to fill in the set for the Club. We'll get together on that this fall, probably on our way to the Chicken Classic.

THE Show STANDARD

by Mary Rosenbaum

Several of our sport magazines have had articles in regards to the field trial dog versus gun dog and field champion versus bench champion. This has been a top debate for years.

Our Brittany comes in for much criticism in regards to size, length of tail, light or dark eye and others.

Are we so caught up in the advancement and development of the Brittany to the degree of winning; that we have overlooked the main purpose our dogs were originally bred for?

The following is from the AKC Breed Standard for the Brittany Spaniel:

A compact dog of medium size, tail no longer than 4 inches, under 171/2" or over 201/2" to be disqualifying, any black in the nose or coat to be disqualifying. The coat to be dense, never curly, ears should carry little fringe, legs should not carry heavy feathering. Note: long, curly or silky hair is a fault. Any tendency towards excessive feathering should be severely penalized as undesirable in a sporting dog. A prominent full or pop eye should be heavy penalized. Light or mean looking eyes to be heavily penalized. Drooling to receive a heavy penalty. Overshot or undershot jaw to be penalized heavily. An extremely heavy bone is as much a fault as spindly bone. Flat feet, splayed feet, paper feet, etc., are to be heavily penalized.

Why are the standards developed? Mainly to develop a certain type of dog and above all to keep our Brittany "the dual dog."

Are we finally dooming our breed like the Setter, Pointers and other Spaniel breeds that compete in show competition? Large heavy bone and excessive feathering and coat along with a multitude of other sins that keep these dogs out of the field. How many of these dogs are ever field trialed; let alone used under the owner's gun!

More and more of our top show winners are so far from these standards now, will it be just a matter of time till the standards are changed or over-

looked in our quest for the perfect show Brittany.

Are we defeating the purpose of why our breed was developed? Why are so many of our breed being excessively groomed, clipped and restyled? If our dogs were bred according to the above standards these methods would not be necessary. Our show judges are swayed to what the breed enthusiast wants, but is this our desire and ultimate goal for our Brittany?

Now is the time to take a good long look at our little Brittany. How much longer will he be truly called "the dual dog?"

RECENT Happenings AT A.K.C.

A lot of interesting things have been going on at the AKC in the past few months. Here are some of them.

CHANGE IN APPEARANCE

In the May issue of the Gazette, the official AKC magazine, an article appeared on the showing of dogs that have had their appearance changed by artificial means.

When one speaks of a dog's appearance being changed by artificial means one immediately thinks of dogs that have had surgery to correct ear carriage or surgery to remove the inner eyelid. Any such surgical procedure makes a dog ineligible for dog shows. So does the operation that corrects entropion (a condition where the eyelid turns inward causing irritation to the eye that may result in blindness), or a pectineal myotomy (the cutting of the muscle to relieve pain caused by HD).

Dogs that have been spayed or castrated, or males that have one or both testicles missing cannot be shown in dog shows but are eligible for competition in field trials.

Also not eligible for awards at shows are dogs whose natural color has been changed by artificial means, dogs that have been whitened by loading the coat with chalk for instance. The AKC even went on record as opposing trimming that has the effect of concealing or removing a condition which would be a fault under the breed standard. In the Brittany breed this would apply to dogs with curly coats that had been stripped to give the appearance of a smooth coat.

Their reasoning was that, if any change had been made in the dog, the judge would not be expected to guess what the dog might have looked like without the change.

The only changes spoken of as allowable were those like the removal of dewclaws or the docking of tails that were usual and customary for the breed.

The article also hit hard on the use of drugs with any use of a stimulant or

depressant to change the outward appearance of the dog's disposition declared to be illegal. If such a drug had the effect of tranquilizing an overly aggressive dog or stimulating one that was sluggish and listless it was considered as altering the dog's appearance by artificial means. Neither does the AKC look with favor on the use of drugs to kill pain, drugs that might improve the gait of a dog that suffered from arthritis. We will quote the portion about the use of drugs in full as it also applies to field trials.

"It should be obvious that any person who exhibits a dog in the show ring knowing that the dog has been changed in appearance by artificial means, subjects himself to charges of conduct prejudicial to the best interest of purebred dogs, dog show or obedience trials, if the change is such that it might be considered to improve the dog's appearance or behavior in the ring. The same situation would even apply at field trials if a dog had been subjected to a drug or other procedure that might be considered as tending to improve its performance in the field. Such conduct might be subject to a Bench Show, Obedience Trial or Field Trial Committee hearing at the event or immediately following it, or might be subject to formal charges preferred by or through The American Kennel Club and heard by a Trial Board."

In the show ring the responsibility for detecting the change is up to the judge. He disqualifies the dog if, in his opinion, the dog is under the influence of drugs. No proof is required. If the judge fails to detect the change a written protest on the dog may be filed by any other competitor.

It would seem wise for participants in trials to refrain from giving their dog any type of medication prior to their running. Dosage with any type of medication might be misinterpreted by a competitor and be cause for a protest to the Field Trial Committee.

WOMEN' LIB

After lo these many years it seems that women's rights may finally receive their just due at the AKC. At a recent Board Meeting the delegates were requested to give serious thought to a change that the AKC is considering. The AKC has only allowed male delegates to be appointed by member clubs. They are now seriously thinking of opening the door to women to serve in this capacity.

TRIAL CONFLICTS

Last spring there were five trials on the same week-end within a 200 mile radius in the east that had stakes open to GSP's. Complaints resulted and the AKC is looking into the possibility of applying the same rule to the field that applies to shows.

With our provision for a Field Trial Date Committee to carefully coordinate dates, watching for conflicts, it is probable that Brittany clubs would continue to arrange their date schedule in the same manner as we now do. No more difficulties would be anticipated than at present.

If a ruling is made it may have an effect on the clubs that open some of their stakes to other breeds, because, if the ruling follows show procedure, no two events open to the same breed may be held on the same day within a 200 mile radius. Therefore any Brittany Club's trial scheduled on the same weekend as a GSP trial in the same area would not be able to open any of its stakes to GSP's.

BEGINNER'S BASIC

The breech is the rear portion of the bore of a firearm where the cartridge or shell is inserted into the chamber. The breech block is a sliding metal block at the breech which serves to plug the rear of the bore, supporting the head of the cartridge when the gun is fired. The breech bolt takes the thrust of the expanding gases and blocks the force of these gases to the rear. The peak of this rearward pressure is expressed in pounds per square inch. During testing, this breech pressure is measured with a special pressure gauge.

SPRING TRIAL

The North Jersey Brittany Club held its spring 1972 field trial over the demanding courses of the Assunpink Wildlife Management Area, Monmouth County, New Jersey. The club was gratified to accept 137 entries for its four stake program held on Saturday and Sunday, April 9 and 10, 1972.

Saturday morning brought weather condition's almost beyond description. The temperature was in the high teens and the wind was estimated at about 30 miles per hour. In short, it was bonechilling cold. The Open All-age broke away at 7:00 a.m. under the judgment of Wrightson Clinton and Thomas Kerwin and the Open Puppy began at 8:00 with Victor Mazza, Jr., and Harry Tinsman making the decision in that stake. All of these men are well-known in New Jersey bird dog circles as able judges and outstanding amateur handlers. addition, all of them are accomplished horsemen and little, if anything, escaped from the scope of their observation. They were courteous, but direct, with all handlers, made several precise judgments under most difficult conditions and their decisions were well-received. It must be said that it took four real bird dog men to ride the first four or five braces Saturday morning in the prevailing weather conditions.

The Open All-age was run up to and across the Ommaney Tower Ridge and then swung towards the kennels. The next brace ran the course in reverse back to the clubhouse. When the last dog was picked up and the results announced, it was no surprise when Tondee's Sandy Valley Duke, handled by his owner, Steve Tardy, was announced the winner. This spring Duke has been just about invincible and has won three more All-age stakes subsequent to this stake. His birdwork was impeccable, his range more than adequate and he han-

dled like a glove.

Duke's reputation as a stud dog is also coming to the fore. The blue ribbon in the Open Puppy was awarded to his daughter, Sandy Valley Duke's Daisy, ably handled by her owner, Bill Ullery.

Holly Mist of Aldwin, capably handled by the veteran professional, Phil Morehouse, captured the Open Derby with a good forward race and very mannerly bird work for a Derby. This is a derby

On Saturday evening, Terry Stankiewicz and the ladies of the club performed admirably hosting a fine cocktail party and a delicious buffet in the clubhouse. It was a splendid event.

This Championship seeks to glorify the class Brittany All-age dog—the one which will be able to improve the breed—a dog which personifies class. The winner must show that he has sufficient field experience, such that he is familiar with the habits of game and versed in finding birds with boldness, intelligence, and style. His interest should be totally directed towards finding birds and his pattern in this pursuit not be discouraged by distant objectives or influenced by easy going. His bird handling should be a breath-taking experience—quality placed ahead of quantity.

This stake requires a wide ranging dog but one whose race is consistent with the course objectives. The winner should show determination and endurance to the point that his pace is consistent throughout his hour performance. He should show independence with reasonable handler contact. He is expected to back if the opportunity presents itself.

Horseback handling is preferred, however it is not required. The horse is a means of conveyance and is intended to be used to facilitate showing this dog at his best.

(Note—For clarification purposes the range of a Brittany All-age should be comparable to the horseback shooting dog but with more independence).

Most of the dogs found birds and most handled them exceptionally well. The judges had little trouble finding dogs to place. The winning dog, Coveymoor's Bomarc, had a very enthusiastic run, but was always under control despite his great range. He topped off his great run with two finds that were handled beautifully. This win was the big one for Mark and surely made his owner, Al Langdon, very proud for he gained the highly coveted title of Dual Champion here. This is the second trial in a row that a dog made his dual title at our trial; last fall Kent Lipsey did it with Jacque of Connie.

Second place was awarded to Maxie as a result of his good wide race and one nice find and a back. Third place was Tygo and fourth was Pistol. I might add that both all-age judges expressed their displeasure at handlers using excessive noise on the course, something that most of us would like to see reduced.

Brittany people around Milwaukee are still talking about the puppy stake as the most outstanding stake they have seen in this area. Many say that the winner, Dualite Mike, is the best pup they have ever seen. The judges were very impressed with the quality of the puppy stake, not only the placed dogs, but many of the dogs that did not place.

The puppy winners also made a very good showing in the Derby stake. Dualite had the widest run of all the derby

dogs, but his bird work did not quite measure up to that of Homer. Homer's run was very good and was topped off with two very classy finds for a derby dog and was awarded first place. Dualite was awarded second. Sam's Chips Britt, another Holman dog, earned third place. A local favorite, Ranger, was named to fourth place.

The Amateur stake is often considered to be an easier or secondary stake, but our stake could have been called the "Parade of Champions." All the placed dogs were field trial champions --one, a Dual Champion, Darrell Gaynor hit us with his famous one-two punch. Pistol showed us just about everything we could expect in a Brittany. He had a beautiful run with little handling, but he was always under control. His bird work was tops; he handled four birds without a flaw. Darrell's other champion Lad took fourth place. Second and third went to two consistent winners. Jacque of Connie and Tyone de Malibeau.

We hope that our fall trial will be just as good with the same people with the same dogs, but perhaps some new winners.

Texas Open Championship

The inaugural running of the Texas Open Brittany Championship was held February 21-22 on the bird seeded field trial grounds of the Panhandle National Grasslands just north of Decatur, Texas. Way Kan Fritts, owned by Ron Stevenson of Concord, N.H., and handled by Lyle Johnson of Goddard, Ks., captured the title.

Runner-up honors were taken by Mike Bazooka of Tejas, owned by Bob Richards of Houston, and handled by Rick Smith of Edmond, Okla.

This titular event is now well established nationally and should continue to grow in prestige and popularity. The Texas Open Brittany Championship Association petitioned for recognition of the Championship and after supporting the Association through two successful "Classics," held in 1970-71, was granted the distinctive title.

Bill Norvell, secretary of the Association, spearheaded much of the operations of the Championship and certainly deserves a grand applause for his efforts. The entire event ran with the smoothness of a well oiled machine. Leo Gales, a field trial committeeman, could be seen as Norvell's man Friday and was on hand throughout the running, helping out with keeping the courses furbished with pen raised quail, handling the dog wagon and doing much of the marshalling, just to mention a few of his duties that were handled with perfection.

It was a pleasure for this scribe to share the judging assignment with Earl Clevinger of Mesquite, Texas, and James Faulkner, also of Texas.

The Championship got underway on schedule at 8 a.m. on Monday with clear skies, gusting winds and, before the day was over, the temps soared in the high 20's. Since very little rain has been received in the Grasslands in several months, conditions were quite dusty dry and a few of the good watering holes were dry. There's an old saying that only a fool will try to predict Texas weather and Tuesday was quite a different story as the skies were cloudy and

a brisk breeze switched from the north making those heavy coats necessary and temperatures hung below 40 degrees.

Even with such arid conditions existing as well as unfavorable weather, bird work was in abundance with 15 of the 21 starters having one or more finds.

THE WINNERS AND OTHERS

Way Kan Fritts ran in the concluding brace of the first day, braced with Pacolet Cheyenne Sam. The breakaway was at 5:12 p.m. with both dogs going straight-a-way at full speed with one casting left and the other right. Both are capable of eye-catching performances and this race was just that. Fritts found birds at 16 minutes and handled them beautifully but came on point at 23 minutes and no game was raised. Sam had been giving a good account of himself and pointed in a heavy thicket near the lake. No one saw birds get up but handler shot and brought the dog out. Meantime Fritts was really performing for the other two judges and went on a wide cast reaching to good habitat and made a beautiful find at 48 minutes. He finished strongly and was looking for more birds at pick-up.

The runner-up, Mike Bazooka of Tejas, ran in the first brace of the trial coupled with Char-Lee O'Dee. Mike broke away to the ridge at the left while Charlie took the treeline at the right. Charlie pointed at 11 minutes, the flush was made and Charlie held steady for the shot. Mike found game at 16 minutes and was also steady. Charlie pointed at 30 minutes but no birds were

raised. He repeated at 50 minutes and was picked up. Mike seemed to be sweeping the course and was credited with a stop-to-flush at 35 minutes. He stacked up on birds at 59 minutes and handled them with experience.

Among the better races were those laid down by Gideon of Richmont and Rufus Rastus Johnson Brown. Unfortunately Gideon disappeared and was ruled out of judgment. Fluke de Britt had his running shoes on, was a little hard to handle at times, but finished in good shape. Fisty Miss Kaer and Brandy's Bullet were an excellent brace. They ran well but had trouble pinning difficult birds.



Handler finally reached him, made a quick stab to locate bird and sent the dog on. Terry roaded directly to the bird working it as it went, the wrong way of the wind. He pinned it positively and exactly, a beautiful piece of work.


